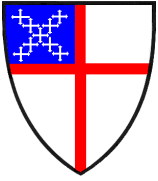

Vicar's Voice

I'd like to give you an update on the activities of the Building Committee. The members of this committee have been diligently working to design and plan our new building, and I'm grateful to them for their sacrifice of time and energy.

The Design Committee has held over fifteen intensely focused meetings with the architect this year. We've agreed upon a floor plan and we're working on the appearance of the building, the landscaping, site plan, parking, and interior design. It's a big challenge.

Steve Rice, one of the principal architects at Rice, Fergus, Miller in Bremerton, has been guiding us through the design process. Steve has patiently listened and responded to our thoughts and ideas, and each round of design brings us closer to a successful building.

We received a nice surprise when Steve announced that he is donating several Douglas fir logs that were cut from property he is developing. The logs were milled into lumber at Smyth Lumbermill in Indianola and we'll use them to build a picnic shelter as well as to create a backdrop for our new altar.

I'm glad to report that we've received an offer to buy our current property. The contract is for a good price and it allows us to stay in the church rent-free for a year, so that we'll only have to move once. We've sent it on to the diocese for their approval and signature. We're keeping Bishop Greg and the Board of Directors up to date on our progress.

The financing of our new church comes from a variety of sources, including the pledges from our capital campaign last year. Because not all of the pledges will have come in by the time we start building, we'll ask for a bridge loan from the diocese to cover the unpaid pledges. We'll pay off that loan with the pledges as they come in. We also need to get about another \$200,000 in the form of a loan or grant.

The timeline for construction indicates that we'll start construction next April and finish before Christmas. Currently we're a little behind on that timeline, but hopefully we can make it up.

I hope you'll continue to pray that God will guide our efforts and bless our progress.

Diocesan Convention 2015

Carolyn and I (Charles) wish to thank you for sending us as your delegates to convention. Following convention we formed a plan for report back to you. If this article feels like it has two voices, it does. We agreed that I would summarize the business and she would cover the life of convention and, by extension, the diocese.

The business part of convention is the subject of a plethora of documents. Fortunately they are categorized. The “A” category are largely administrative; these include items like the agenda, floor plan so we can find things etc.

I think of “B” as ballot or voting on those who have been nominated for various positions. (Everyone votes on all of these.) The results are:

I think of “C” as the cash section since it concerns the budget. The budget was adopted as written.

The “D” section could be so named for items up for “discussion”. This section contains the resolutions that were submitted in advance of convention (numbers 1 through 5) and those received within the first six hours of convention. These were not given numbers so I’ll assign numbers 6 and 7.

2017 Diocesan Assessment Rate - Approved

Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) to Clergy Salary Scale for 2016 - Approved

Continuing Support for the Millennium Development Goals - Approved

Concerning Response to Central American Refugees - Approved

Calling for Respect for Human Dignity in Campaign Season - Approved

A Resolution Decrying Violence in our Society - Not considered (the resolution committee offered to work with the campus ministry youth who put forward the resolution in order to prepare it for consideration by the 2016 convention)

Regarding 2017 as the 500th Anniversary year of the Beginning of the Reformation - Not considered

The “E” section is mostly reports, but I think of it as “everything else”.

This includes the proposed changes to the diocesan constitution (E.1). All three changes passed.

The changes to the canons (also E.1) must be approved, in the same form, at two consecutive conventions. All of the changes considered were “first vote” or first convention. All of the proposed changes passed.

The changes to the Cathedral Constitution (E.12) were also approved.

The other documents in this section (E.2 through E.11) did not require a vote.

At the end of the Convention, we were asked to fill out an evaluation form. On it there was an empty block of space where we were asked to write “what part of the convention did you most enjoy”. I had to write that having the discussion with our token college student who sat with our table during the banquet was my favorite part of the Convention. These young college students from the UW and WWU were our hosts for the convention and provided inspiration as well as the beautiful plainsong style music for the evening prayer service Friday night.

At our banquet table we had a lively discussion with regards to the meaning of THE JESUS MOVEMENT.

THE JESUS MOVEMENT was the theme of the 105th Convention of the Diocese of Olympia and it was inspired by the new Presiding Bishop, MICHAEL CURRY.

You could hear reference to this theme throughout the entire convention... from the different workshops we attended to the resolutions that were ratified, to the Bishop Rickel’s address and to the reports on topics such as the Rwanda Reconciliation from which we are all encouraged to learn the value of love, forgiveness reconciliation among all peoples of the world.

Rev. Philbert Kalisa who was born in a refugee camp to parents who had escaped the horrific genocide that happened there. He later was given scholarship to study in England and became an Anglican priest and returning to Rwanda to help with the physical and emotional healing of that country and founded REACH

We had a reports on the needs of the people of El Salvador.

We heard a report about EPISCOPAL RELIEF & DEVELOPMENT (see www.episcopalrelief.org)

and the SEEDS OF HOPE which provides relief for refugees in the Middle East.

We heard a report on the ongoing study and work being done by the BISHOPS COMMITTEE ON THE ISRAEL/ PALESTINE CRISES

We saw a video on the pilgrimage that clergy from our diocese took to Palestine in an effort to learn more about the devastation as a result from the conflict ...where people were forced to flee for their lives, and where now the streets are virtually empty and buildings crumbled. We learned about the help being provided though the Episcopal Church, particularly with respect to the traumatized and displaced youth.

Then there is the ongoing work being done by CAMPUS MINISTRIES where young college students encourage open discussion on inclusivity among people of different faiths, races, sexual orientation, socioeconomic backgrounds and handicapped... people who are too often marginalized.

A number of these young people are the ones who hosted our convention and who ate with us at the table as I mentioned.

It was wonderful to hear about their intention to create a positive atmosphere where sensitive issues can be, and are discussed... and where there is an honest desire for new learning and understanding with the love and compassion taught by our Leader, the Head of the Church. This is the THE JESUS MOVEMENT!

“What does the Jesus Movement mean to you? ... and why are you a part of a church community that centers itself on and with Jesus? What drew you to this community and what makes you stay.”

These are the questions we discussed at our banquet table. It would be neat to have the discussion here.... maybe at a Wednesday night study session.

Again, thank you for sending us as your delegates to the convention. It was not only fun and enlightening; we have a renewed pride in being part of this great body of Christianity, or as Presiding Bishop Michael Curry put it, in being part of the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement.

People's Warden

I would like to provide an update regarding the woods behind and beside the St. Antony's buildings; there have been a few changes since the last parish wide e-mail.

First, the older campsite (vacant for several years) has seen two work-parties. All of the trash has been removed and, over the course of three weeks, was disposed of via our regular trash service. Several pieces of metal and a patio umbrella remain. These were collected into a single place (still up on the hill) and await a volunteer willing to include them in their next trip to the dump.

Second, the campsite that created the concern on 27 September continues to be vacant and clean as announced to the parish.

Finally, the trash that had accumulated in and around the parking lot sand bucket (a re-purposed trash can at the top of the stairs) has been cleaned up. The sand that remains was transferred into two buckets as it was hard to reach and it was too heavy to just dump it out of the previous container. This needs a new location for a couple of reasons:

- To avoid inviting a new pile of trash
- Protect it (to a limited point) from the weather so it is not full of rain when the freezing weather comes causing it to become a block of ice and unusable for traction.

Suggestions and assistance with the items above are invited.
