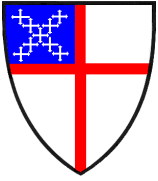

Vicar's Voice

"The earth is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof." (Psalm 24:1)

That verse is for me the beginning of all stewardship, because it reminds me of my place in God's creation. All things come from God, and everything I have comes from God. When I hike in the mountains, I'm aware that I'm a part of God's creation, and everything has a place in the creation.

Everything comes from God. As a child of God and a follower of Jesus Christ, I've been given the gift of life and the gift of salvation. Everything I do is a response to this giftedness. As a baptized person, my response is to be a steward of these gifts, and to use them wisely.

My life at St. Antony's is one way I respond to God's gifts. I worship God at St. Antony's, I share the life of community at St. Antony's, and I take part in the ministries of St. Antony's. My participation at church is one way I am a steward of God's gifts.

It's been said that "Stewardship is every Christians' primary vocation." The way we use our time, talent, and treasure in every area of our lives is our true vocation and calling. Stewardship isn't just giving money to the church, but giving ourselves in every area of our lives.

I hope that I use my time, talent, and treasure wisely in all areas of my life. I know that my faith is a very important part of my life, and I want to give it its proper place. One way I do that is by making a pledge to St. Antony's. The standard of giving in the Episcopal Church is 10% of one's income. This is a high standard, and not many attain to it, but it's the Biblical standard as well as the traditional measure of giving.

This year I have given \$472 a month as my pledge to the operating fund at St. Antony's, plus \$120 a month as my pledge to the Building Fund. That makes \$592 a month, which is right at 10% of my monthly paycheck. In addition, I give to various worthy causes as I'm able. Right now those amounts are small, but I hope to increase them.

It's taken many years for me to work up to giving 10%, but I'm glad that I've been able to reach that goal. Now that it's part of my monthly budget, it only seems natural and normal, and I'm thankful that I'm able to give back to God a portion of what God has given me. In the next year, I'll increase my pledge to match my increase in salary, about 1.6%.

As you consider your pledge to St. Antony's for next year, I hope you'll remember that "The earth is the Lord's, and the fullness thereof," and be generous in your response.

2015 Diocesan Convention

The Diocese of Olympia will hold its 104th Annual Convention on November 13 and 14 in Lynnwood, WA. The theme this year will be *So that All Might See Jesus*. Your delegates from St. Antony's will be Charles Smith and Carolyn Sorrell. Alternate Delegates are Gail Westin and Bill Demmon. You are encouraged to voice your thoughts and opinions to these delegates so that we may represent St. Antony's as accurately as possible when voting on the issues presented. The issues include: the diocesan budget, nominations for new members to the Standing Committee and to the Diocesan Council, and ratification of the purposed resolutions. All of these items are described in detail on the Diocesan website www.ecww.org/annualconvention

Also on the website you will find the bios of nominees for the committees. We can be proud that our own vicar, Rev. Bill Fulton is one of the esteemed members of the Standing Committee which "serves as Council of advice for the bishop and becomes the diocesan ecclesiastical authority in the bishop's absence."

The resolutions put forth for ratification so far include the following:

1. 2017 Diocesan Assessment Rate
2. Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) to Clergy Salary Scale for 2016
3. Continuing Support for the millennium Development Goals
4. Concerning Response to Central American Refugees
5. Calling for Respect for Human Dignity in Campaign Season

At the pre-convention meeting of delegates, it was pointed out that we might want to pay particular attention to the last two resolutions, as they have brought about the most discussion.

Again, If you have any questions, concerns or suggestions please let them be known. Your thoughts and considerations are vital to the roll St. Antony's plays in the work of the diocese and ultimately to the work of the Episcopal Church on a national level.

Gather - Grow - Go ... Communications in Real Life.

During the last few months the communications process within St. Antony has improved dramatically as shown by our actions and the positive result concerning the couple discovered living in our forest.

Gather:

As the awareness of their presence became known, it became apparent the issue of "Nick and Carrie" and their situation was not a widely known topic. Rumors flew, some folks talked among themselves, until eventually the BC was officially notified. What the broader St. Antony's congregation knew about Nick and Carrie was minimal at best. The process of gathering information commenced, conversations were held with Nick and Carrie, the issue of what to do was an agenda item for the September BC Meeting.

Grow:

As September went along, it became apparent that not everyone in the congregation knew about the couple in the forest. Communications improved through face-to-face conversations, through prayer and informative emails, and various meetings to exchange information among all involved. It became clear something must be done. Generosity, concerns, Christian kindness, and legal issues were all discussed. Our level of information grew and our ability to communicate was again improving and growing.

Go:

Through interest and efforts of many, plans were put in to action to improve Nick and Carrie's situation. We communicated with local community resources and we offered funds and items to assist the couple. In short, we Gathered information and communicated ... we Grew our knowledge of the couple's situation ... we discussed options and developed a set of initiatives to Go help them ... and therefore as we reached out to Nick and Carrie we also brought the local community resources to bear. We informed the Diocese. We kept status emails flowing. We kept talking and doing.

And, as a result of the actions of many and an improved process of communication, a need was discovered, concern was raised, discussions of what needed and could be done occurred, actions happened, and the lives of Nick and Carrie improved.

Finally, lessons were learned on how to improve communications skills. The BC learned how to inform the congregation better, and the Love of Christ to help those in need was evident in every quarter.

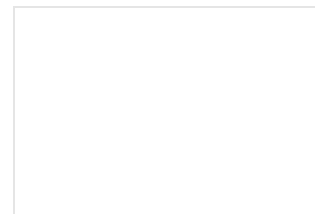

Getting to Know You – Verbal Sketches of St. Antony Parishioners

Pamela Morton has lived in this area for some time. Earlier this year she visited St. Antony, liked what she found, and became a regular “8 o’clocker.” We are very glad she did!

A “cradle Episcopalian,” Pam was born in Utah, but as a child moved with her family to Port Townsend where she completed high school. She then attended both Western Washington University and the University of Utah where she studied fine arts and interior design. Following marriage, she and her husband settled in the Northwest as restaurateurs, owners of the Clambake in Port Orchard and the Lobster Shop at Dash Point in Federal Way.

In these enterprises and while raising a family, Pamela says her involvement was always with the accounting department rather than the complexities of food preparation - though she adds that today, as a hobby, she likes cooking and trying out new recipes.

Following the sojourn in the restaurant business, she became independently employed and used her accounting skills to work for various firms in different locations - Carmel, Monterey, Sedona, Seattle, and others. Some jobs dealt with property management, but one that was distinctly different was her position as accountant for the US Ski Team home-based in Park City, Utah. There she not only had the pleasure of getting to know individual athletes, but she and her children also enjoyed the abundance of skiing opportunities the resort town offered.

Today Pam continues to be a fan of the outdoors. Besides walking and working out regularly, she skies at Crystal, likes to hike in the Olympics with her brother when he visits from Colorado, and enjoys being a part of Tony’s Trekkers.

In between many such activities, she undertook the challenging task of remodeling a home she purchased in Keyport - one with a bird’s eye view of the water. It was a rather daunting project for a single woman, but Pamela (who says she’s up to “taking a risk on things”) was able to consult with both her brother and her son who are in the building trades. The project also gave her an opportunity to put into practice her earlier studies in fine arts and interior design.

Building Committee

I am happy to report that the design of our new facility has reached a major milestone. The floor plan has been completed and is moving into design development. The Design Committee has worked very well and put in many hours of evening meetings to reach this point. Kudos to them and Rice Fergus Miller Architects. Now in the process is the exterior design and finish selections. This will work concurrently with the filing of paperwork with Kitsap County as we move forward toward actual permits. Several permits will be required along with a minor amendment to the Conditional Use Permit (CUP). CUP amendment will take 90 days or so after documents are delivered to the county. No permits will be issued until CUP amendment is approved.

Meetings with the county have already notified them of the minor changes and no resistance has been detected to the amendments. We are hopefully looking a smooth process with the county.

You may have heard of the addition of a “Picnic” Shelter to also be placed on the new property. This shelter is proposed to go into the grove of trees near where we have held the August service and picnic the past three years. Recently our architect Steve Rice had some tall Doug Fir trees removed from his property. These trees have been taken to a mill and the timbers are being donated to St. Antony’s for use in the shelter project and some interior finish work of the new church. This is a wonderful donation of lumber. I hope that members of the congregation will donate to help cover the cost of the milling of the timbers. We need to raise about \$3,000. What a little amount for so much of a gift. All the new timbers will be stacked in the barn and allowed to dry slowly and naturally. This will make beautiful wood for the shelter. It is expected that the shelter will become regularly used for outside services, weddings, picnics, church school activities and VBS. Community groups may use the new shelter. What a wonderful out reach for St. Antony’s into the community around us.

The Holy Spirit continues to guide us as we continue with our project.
