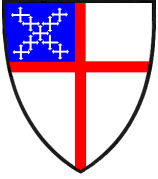

Dear Friends,

As we enter Holy Week I want to not only invite, but also encourage you to join in remembering the High Holy Days of the Church year.

If we look closely at the liturgies of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Great Vigil on Saturday we can discover that this is actually one continuous celebration that is divided over three days to recall the greatest event in the history of the world.

We begin our recollection of these holiest of days on Palm Sunday with the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem. On Thursday we remember the dinner where Jesus instituted the Eucharist, the meal that Christians throughout the world still celebrate today. It is also on this day that we remember the example of servant-hood given to us by Jesus.

On Friday we remember the passion and death of Jesus. On this most somber of days we are reminded how great of a sacrifice Jesus made for each of us.

Saturday we celebrate the Great Vigil. It is the first service of Easter Day. The opening greeting of this liturgy is:

Dear friends in Christ: On this most holy night, in which our Lord Jesus passed over from death to life, the Church invites her members, dispersed throughout the world, to gather in vigil and prayer. For this is the Passover of the Lord, in which, by hearing his Word and celebrating his Sacraments, we share in his victory over death.

This sums up what we are about. It is the most holy night! It is our Passover!

Please, if you can, join us in remembering and celebrating the Paschal Mystery this week on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday evenings.

Vicar's Voice

I hope you'll read Fr. Craig's article in this newsletter on the significance of our Holy Week liturgies. He points out the continuity that runs through these services as we remember and re-experience Christ's suffering, death and resurrection during Holy Week.

As for my article, I'd like to touch on something much more mundane -- the way we share our blessings, thanksgivings and announcements. Sometimes these take so much time at the 10:00 Eucharist that they prevent us from starting worship on time. I've received a number of comments about this over the years.

The sharing of our blessings and thanksgivings is part of the character of our church family. By sharing a little of our lives, we feel connected to one another, especially during significant life events. This sharing also allows us to add these joys and concerns to our prayers.

But there is such a thing as too much sharing. Sometimes our sharing becomes the occasion for long personal stories, family anecdotes, or promotional talks. These are inappropriate. A brief sharing of a significant event or experience is sufficient.

The same goes for announcements. When we're excited about a ministry we're involved in, we naturally want to share our passion and get everyone else involved. Sometimes we feel that the written announcements in the newsletter and bulletin aren't enough, and we want to punctuate them with a verbal announcement. Having lots of announcements shows that our parish is alive.

But there is such a thing as too much announcements. Sometimes a brief announcement turns into a prolonged explanation or a complicated mass of details or an impassioned plea. These are speeches, not announcements. All we need is the headline, not the full article. Give us the title, but don't read us the whole book. Don't forget that the written announcements are the primary way we share information.

Our worship is a holy time, and the liturgy in the Prayer Book is designed to lead us into the presence of God through Word and Sacrament. There is a flow to our worship that provides dignity, reverence, and meaning, and we don't want to lose that balance. Let's start our worship with a brief time of connecting with one another, then enter into the mystery of the liturgy together with our full attention.

Journey To Adulthood begins

We're starting a new program for our young people ages 14-16 called Journey To Adulthood. J2A, as it is commonly known, is a nationally recognized Episcopal program for young people that originated at St. Philip's Episcopal Church in Durham, North Carolina. It's used by thousands of Episcopal churches throughout the country.

The two premises of the program are that manhood and womanhood are gifts from God, and adulthood is earned, not given. As a young person goes through the stages of adolescence and maturity, they need to learn what it means to be a faithful, mature adult with a deep faith. Journey To Adulthood provides a liturgical frame for young people, helps them celebrate their creativity and individuality, and gives them skills need to be an adult in church and society.

Beth Rohlfsing and Fr. Bill will be mentoring this group of young people with an eye towards Confirmation next January when Bishop Rickel makes his visitation to St. Antony's. Currently the group meets every Wednesday at 4 pm for one hour. If you know any young people who would like to join the group, please talk to Beth or Fr. Bill.

The Sanctuary Lamp

Recently I was asked about the significance of the red lamp that burns in the sanctuary. This lamp is placed on top of the aumbry, a box that contains consecrated bread and wine that have been reserved after the celebration of the Eucharist on Sunday. We set this bread and wine aside so that we can take Communion to those who are sick or homebound, something we do on a regular basis. The sanctuary lamp is a signal that there is reserved sacrament present in the aumbry, and is a reminder of the presence of Christ in the sanctuary. The sanctuary lamp is extinguished for Good Friday, as a symbol of Christ's death on the cross. It is re-lit from the Easter Vigil fire, and is kept lit all year long by the Altar Guild. Each candle burns for seven days so that the candle never goes out. You may make a donation of \$10.00 to buy a sanctuary candle as a memorial or thanksgiving.
