

#### **Communications**

Question: "What does the Bible say about communication?

As I was thinking about Rev Fulton's homily from Sunday, April 19<sup>th</sup>, and <u>1 John 3:1-7</u>, a reading from that Sunday, I was wondering where else does the Bible speak about communications. I found some ideas which you'll find in this article.

The two most important types of communication are 1) between man and God and 2) between human beings. Communication is more than just our ability to talk, but also to listen. As we communicate with God, the first part of that communication is listening. God's primary ways of communication with us are through the His Word (Romans 10:17) and by the Holy Spirit (John 14:26). God speaks to all believers through the vehicle of the Bible, "...useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness." (2 Timothy 3:16). In order to fully understand God's communication with us, we must be diligent to read, study, and meditate on His Word.

Our primary mode of communication with God is prayer. We are to go to God in prayer for all our needs. When we lack something, God says that it is not from His inability to provide but from our lack of diligence to ask or asking with the wrong motives (<u>James 4:2-3</u>). Even Jesus prayed - We are to follow His example and "pray continually" (<u>1 Thessalonians 5:17</u>).

Second, we must examine how we communicate with those around us. When we speak in anger, we fail to show God's love. Whether speaking to a family member, a member of St. Antony's, or a stranger, our communication should always come forth in a loving manner. (Re-reading 1 John 3:1-7 might help here.)

#### Why we see what we see: Colors

Many of us recognize that the vestment colors that we see our priests wearing reflect the seasons of the church year: Purple or blue signifies Advent, White is for Christmas, the Feast of the Epiphany and for the Easter season, Green is ordinary time, and red, of course, is Pentecost and Palm Sunday.



Beyond this, the colors represent more than the season. Purple indicates penitence, blue reflects royalty. White signifies purity and festivals. Green indicates ordinary time, a time of growth. Red reminds us of the fire of the Holy Spirit or the blood of the martyrs. The bishop has a purple or crimson colored cassock and may wear either a purple or crimson shirt. The symbol on the front of our altar is the Chi-Rho symbol. It is one of the oldest symbols of Christian faith and consists of the superimposed Greek letters chi (X) and rho (P), which are the first two letters of "Christ" in Greek.

#### New Facts on Episcopal Church Growth

What do you think might be a distinguishing feature of an Episcopal church located in Western USA and characterized by the following: a chaotic coffee hour, two or more different types of services, and a crowded special events calendar? According to "New Facts on Episcopal Church Growth and Decline," \*\* those all are qualities likely to be evidence of a growing church. (Yes, the western location seems a bit of a surprise.) The findings, discussed in the report and based on "Parochial Report Data and the 2014 Survey of Episcopal Congregations," would seem especially pertinent to us at St. Antony's and are worthy of examination as we look forward to building a new church and the growth we hope it will bring.

The report states there are numerous avenues toward, and indications of, growth and vitality. Among them:

- The congregation has a clear mission and purpose.
- Members sense a "spiritual life, rather than simply human relationships and organizational/ritual activity."
- Sunday School is emphasized as is children's participation in worship.

Besides the above factors, the thirty-page report addresses several other aspects of church growth and decline. While St. Antony would seem to be in the "growth column" in most categories, still the report has "facts" (as the title states) that could help us understand ourselves better and perhaps guide us as we move ahead with our plans for building a new church.

One of the goals set last February at the Bishop's Committee Retreat was to grow the congregation by five percent this year. That number was picked not to quantify "success" as in a business venture, but as a way of gauging how well we are reaching out to meet spiritual and other needs in our community. It will take all of us working together to accomplish this goal. I would encourage everyone to read the online report for two reasons: to affirm/confirm what we are already doing as a growing church and to help us identify additional ways by which we can foster further growth as we move forward in the fulfillment of our mission.
