Vicar's Voice

On June 26, 1995, The Rt. Rev. Bill Smalley, Bishop of Kansas, laid hands on me and ordained me a priest in Christ's one holy catholic and apostolic Church. I had just graduated from three years of seminary and moved with my family to a small town in Kansas where I had been called as the rector of two small Episcopal churches, serving half-time in each.

The old stone church was packed and the eighty-eight year old organist rose to the occasion with a splendid opening hymn. It was a magnificent ceremony. It made me deeply aware of the gravity and beauty of my calling.

Eugene Peterson, in his book Pastor, writes, "I can't imagine now not being a pastor. I was a pastor long before I knew I was a pastor; I just never had a name for it." I feel much the same about my vocation. As Frederick Buechner has famously said, "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." That's the way it's been for me.

Since my ordination, I've learned a lot about what it means to be a priest, and my family has learned about being a clergy family. There's a certain fishbowl effect, and the sense of being accountable to many people for many expectations, some of which are never expressed in words.

It's my nature to want to be helpful to others. I enjoy the warmth of human relationships. I love being at the center of a vibrant parish community. Being present at life-changing events in my parishioner's lives is deeply fulfilling to me. I am blessed to be your priest.

I've learned that I can't possibly meet all the expectations included in the word "priest." There's a temptation to put on an outward show of being the perfect clergy person, but this temptation only leads to being a puffed-up caricature of a priest. I've found that the best thing I can do is simply be my own authentic self. This has taken a lot of inner work.

In many ways the priest is a symbol for the divine, but at the same time the priest is a very human being. I'm grateful God has used my simple earthen vessel for his wonderful purposes.

Faith Formation

Thanks to the work of many people, faith formation has been busy. I can't cover everything in faith formation; however, I will mention five:

Contemplative book study - Carolyn reports that many of those involved in the study of Cynthia Bourgeault's *Wisdom Jesus* are also involved in seasonal activities so this study is entering a season of rest. Please contact Carolyn Sorrell if you wish to join this book study when it resumes. There are other book studies not mentioned here, please watch the bulletin for information about each group.

Sunday School - Melanie and Sandy shared their gratitude and love while talking about our youth and the 2014 - 2015 Sunday School year. Recognition Sunday was 21 June; however, they are already thinking about the 2015 - 2016 Sunday School year and the possibility of adding a third class. If you have a calling for helping with Sunday School, please let them know.

Vacation Bible School - This year we will be participating in Vacation Bible School with New Fellowship Church. Vacation Bible School will be in October; more detail as it becomes available. This year, New Fellowship Church will provide the Vacation Bible School coordinator. We are being asked to identify people who are willing to get involved. Please let Charles Smith know if you are interested.

Cursillo - Perhaps I should say Cursillo 2.0. This is a faith formation program offered through the Diocese of Olympia in which St. Antony's has taken an active part. For the last two years the Diocese of Olympia has been embracing the challenge to re-invigorate the program, not only for the diocese but also for the national church. Now the national church has asked Bishop Greg Rickel to be the bishop for Cursillo nationally and Cursillo in the Diocese of Olympia to document Cursillo 2.0 in preparation for bringing version 2.0 to all of the dioceses nationwide. The Secretariat (the local leadership for Cursillo) met, discussed and prayed about this and came to realize that they could not meet it and give their all to a Cursillo weekend. Since it is only right to give our best to a Cursillo weekend, the next weekend will be delayed until next spring. This has not stopped St. Antony's from raising up people to participate in the weekend when it comes. Two have already been accepted and two others have requested applications. Kairos - The next Kairos weekend will be October 15-18, 2015. Charles Smith has already been accepted to the team and he has been asked to look for others who might be interested in finding out more about Kairos. Opportunities include: seeing the change-in and faith-of those were candidates on a first Saturday, praying for the candidates that God is calling to participate in Kairos 57, praying during the weekend for God's will to be done in the candidates and in the team, making Kairos spiritual cookies, writing agape (letters of encouragement) to the candidates, and visiting a preparation team meeting just to check-it-out.

The last Kairos weekend was under-staffed. Despite the small team, God called more candidates than we have seen in the last couple of years and move the prison administration to allow the size of the program to grow from 30 to 36 candidates. Lay Eucharistic Visitor Program.


Five parishioners have been trained to take part in a new ministry at St. Antony's: Tovi Andrews, Kathy Little, Beth Rohlfing, Olivia Stalter and Loretta McGinley. The Lay Eucharistic Visitor (LEV) program is a licensed ministry with oversight by the Episcopal Diocese of Olympia, and guided by Title III. Canon 4 Section 7: 'A Eucharistic Visitor is a lay person authorized to take the Consecrated Elements in a timely manner following a Celebration of Holy Eucharist to members of the congregation who, by reason of illness or infirmity, were unable to be present at the Celebration. A Eucharistic Visitor should normally act under the direction of a Deacon, if any, or otherwise, the Member of the Clergy or other leader exercising oversight of the congregation or other community of faith.'

Once the Diocese grants licensure for our 5 Lay Eucharistic Visitors, they will be available on a rotational basis to provide Eucharist to interested homebound parishioners following church service on Sunday.

The Lay Eucharistic Visitors will extend the care of our St. Antony church family, to those who are unable to participate in worship services due to extended illness or infirmity. If you would like to arrange a visit, or know someone who could benefit from receiving the Eucharist at home, please contact the church office.

It is a real privilege to report the tremendous success of Building to Serve: God's Field of Dreams Capital Campaign! At the beginning of the year we were excited to report our pledge total of \$419,428, that pledge number has since grown to \$448,967 in the last 6 months! But that's not all... not only have our pledges increased, but the rate at which we are collecting those pledges has exceeded expectation. We currently have 25% of our cash on hand! Thank you to all of you for keeping up with your pledged giving.

The Building Committee has a goal of ground breaking in one year's time and holding services in our new church in December 2016. During the time of construction, there will be continuing expenses from the architect, contractors, county, etc. Since our capital campaign will be ongoing for three years, we will likely need a bridge loan to cover some of those costs, that is until our contributions have all been received. This is typical when building a new church. However, we would like to keep that loan amount to a minimum, so the fact that we are ahead of target with our Cash on Hand is a great comfort.

Getting to Know You - Verbal Sketches of St. Antony Parishioners

If Barbara Berglind were to travel the circuit of places where she has lived, she'd cover several thousand miles. Beginning in Montana where she was born, the journey would continue through villages and towns in Idaho, Utah, Oregon, Colorado, Nevada, and, of course, Washington. This peripatetic life-style was not due to military assignments as with so many in our congregation - but to the family's livelihood coming from the construction trades. By the time Barbara was fifteen, she had attended twelve different schools.

! These geographical changes naturally required flexibility and adjusting, but, as a child, Barbara also had other challenges to face. While she is very quick to say she "always felt loved," family life was unsettled. After the death of her grandmother, she lived with a devoted aunt and uncle who later adopted her.

As the family moved from job to job, Barbara enjoyed a carefree and happy childhood. Then misfortune struck. She developed an ailment that made walking extremely painful. Medical assistance was scarce and the malady remained a mystery for some time. She was bed-ridden for weeks. By chance, the family met a pediatrician who was able to diagnose the problem as Perthes disease, a rare childhood condition. Untreated, the result would probably be shortness of limb and a permanent, marked limp. Solution at that time: a weighted plaster cast for the entire leg for six months, and then four months of crutches for support. Not a welcome situation for a vibrant and active young girl.

Strong support at home helped Barbara overcome these difficulties as did church affiliations that were always important to the family. The frequent moves and lack of churches in some places meant attendance at whatever was available so Barbara was exposed to ecumenism at an early age. Baptized a Roman Catholic under her grandmother's influence, she worshipped mainly in Methodists churches - the denomination predominant in small towns. In Utah, however, her resourceful aunt obtained special permission for the family to attend the Mormon church without having to convert. Eventually, when the family moved to Linton, Oregon, she was confirmed at St. Andrew Episcopal Church in Portland.

Attendance at a variety of schools early in life was a forerunner of Barbara's further education. After graduating from high school (where she met the young man who became her husband), she attended St. Helen's Hall, an Episcopal school and the first accredited junior college in Oregon. She then went on to the University of Oregon and later graduated from Lewis and Clark College.

After marrying, Barbara and her husband lived in several places in the Pacific Northwest including Portland,

Bellevue, Seabeck, Port Ludlow, and Silverdale. They were blessed with a son and daughter and four grandchildren. Barbara's husband died in 2004, and she now has one great-grandchild.

Barbara was an active church member in all the communities she lived in. She has been a teacher and supervisor of Sunday School, Bishop's Warden, and member of various committees. She and her husband, who Barbara says became "an ardent Episcopalian," were one of the first families at St. Antony. Today Barbara is on the Outreach Committee, has recently joined the Welcoming Committee, belongs to two book clubs and is a "Witty Knitter."

There are further interesting details to her story such as her sixteen years of teaching first and second grades in Central Kitsap School District, her scrapbooking hobby, and her extensive travels in North America, Japan, and Western and Eastern Europe.

Many of us who enjoy reading biographies go to the library (or Kindle, etc.) for a selection. At St. Antony's we don't have to do that. We can just chat with Barbara. As a child of the depression era who lived in towns with curious names like "Thistle" and "Rifle," who watched from a construction-site tent as cougars came into the orchard for food, and who overcame a serious illness, Barbara's life reads like a book. She has an interesting and intriguing story to tell.
