Vicar's Voice

The world around us is preparing us for the "hap-hap-happiest time of the year," the season of Christmas, also known as the Holiday Season. For many people, Christmas is the best time of the year because it focuses on gift-giving, decorations, parties, heart-warming Christmas stories and songs, and nostalgia of days gone by.

But for many people, Christmas is not the best time of the year. For those who live alone, Christmas can be a depressing reminder of isolation and loss. For those who have broken relationships within their families or friends, Christmas only highlights the difference between the "perfect" family holiday and their personal reality of hurt and brokenness.

Celebrating Christmas when you're dealing with divorce, cancer or Alzheimer's disease is a struggle. For many people depression is their holiday companion. And for those who have suffered the loss of loved ones, Christmas can be empty.

When I was twenty years old, my father was killed in a car accident on November 8. Our family was stunned by the suddenness of the news. We walked through the funeral and burial ceremonies in a numb haze. By the time Christmas came, we were still in shock. We gathered as we always had, but that year Dad was not there to hand out the presents to each person in turn as he always had. We had to choose someone to take his place, but it just didn't seem right. That memory still tinges my Christmas experience.

So if you or someone you know is experiencing a "blue Christmas" this year, it's a good idea to remember that the meaning of Christmas goes far deeper than piped-in Holiday music and the mad rush of shopping. Christ was born to a poor peasant couple in a humble cattle shed. They weren't a "perfect" family. The simplicity and humility of Jesus' birth keeps us grounded in the love of God come to earth.

May Christ find a home in our hearts, however humble they may be, this Christmas.

Episcopal 101 Class

I am excited to announce this two part class will have its first session **December 11**th **at 11:45** after the 10 am Sunday service. While this class is geared toward our newest members I encourage everyone who has an interest in the history, liturgy, customs, traditions and new direction for the Episcopal Church to attend. This class, led by Fr. Bill Fulton will begin to give some insight as to what differentiates the Episcopal Church from other formal Christian religions - what makes us Episcopalians.

The second class in the series will answer this question on a much smaller scale; what makes St. Antony's special and what does our mission offer to both our parishioners and our community. The date for this class has yet to be set, but look for a date in late January.

Building Committee

October 18th St Antony's received the "Comments Document" from the Kitsap County Department of Community Development-DCD. The document outlined some additions or needed clarification to the drawings provided by the Civil Engineers-MAP ltd. I met with MAP and have they have been actively pursuing the work. There has already been a return site visit by the Geo-Tech firm that is working for MAP to investigate a comment about possible minor heating oil spill in one isolated location. (This is the location where a previous home was located until it burned many years ago. It is suspected that the limited amount of heating oil found in the soil came from the small tank on the side of the home.) The report from the Geo-Tech firm should be available very soon. MAP has committed to meeting the date set by DCD for comment answers and corrections to be returned. Due to the time taken by DCD for issuance of the comments and currently no permit in hand the contractor retained for the project is unable to secure sub-contractors for some of the key portions of the project. Work in Kitsap County is busy now and the subs are hesitant to spend time bidding on non-permitted projects. As soon as the permits are issued the subs will be willing to bid.

The optimistic time line that had been developed previously has now shifted. With the winter weather upon us it is not wise to begin digging in the dirt. So it appears that upon receipt of permits construction will begin in

very early spring. Planning for the first service in the new church will begin as construction dated are firmed up. Please remember to keep the entire Building Committee and the Sub-Committees in your prayers as this wonderful project continues forward.
