Vicar's Voice

It seems to me that we're living in an "in-between time" at St. Antony's. The Bible provides us with a number of "in-between times," in which the people of God had left one settled situation but were not yet to the next. I'm thinking especially of the historical period when Moses and the people were wandering in the Sinai desert.

They'd left their homes in Egypt, where they could rely on melons, leeks and garlic (garden vegetables they'd come to love), but they had not yet entered Canaan, the land of milk and honey. For forty years they had to wander in the desert, an in-between place that was neither here nor there.

At St. Antony's, we've sold our old building, but we're not yet in our new building. We're halfway between, which is almost always an awkward and uncomfortable spot. And yet, like the people of Israel wandering in the desert, we might find that this is a time of learning, formation, and growth.

Our transition team, under the leadership of Peter Stockwell, has been tasked with the responsibility of packing up everything in the narthex, parish hall, and basement. Over thirty years of assorted folders, notebooks, files, costumes, and books have been sorted, organized, inventoried, boxed up, and stored, given away or discarded. My thanks to Peter and the members of his team for their good work.

In the meantime, we're going to experience some jolting changes. Probably the biggest change is the new times for our services. Our 8:00 Eucharist will now begin at 7:30 am, and the 10:00 Eucharist will begin at 9:00 am. Our Sunday routines will change - not an easy thing. In addition, we'll have to shorten the length of our 10:00 Eucharist. It often goes an hour and 15 minutes, but we need to shorten it to an hour so that we can guarantee that New Fellowship can begin at 10:30.

We'll also see some big changes to the decorations in the church. As the new owners of the building, New Fellowship will understandably want to re-paint and re-decorate their new space. It will look and feel different, as it should be. In addition, we'll need to respect their scheduling for the building. They have asked to reserve the use of the parish hall and sanctuary on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday evenings. Our regular Wednesday schedule will remain unchanged, however, and the modular is still available to us.

I know this "in-between" time will be a challenge for us. I'm very encouraged that I've heard only positive comments about the transition, and I'm grateful to see that we are adapting to our new circumstances with optimism and a good spirit.

Some of the greatest lessons were learned by the people of Israel when they wandered in the desert. I'm sure that we, too, will find ourselves stronger and more faithful from this "in-between time."

The Passing of the Peace

Why do we "take time out" between the liturgy of the word and the liturgy of the table? I think our heritage as a liturgical church contains more than a small clue. In the Bible, particularly in the gospel, we find

"Therefore, if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother or sister has some thing against you, leave your gift there in front of the altar. First go and be reconciled to them; then come and offer your gift. - Matthew 5:23-24

The church of centuries past took this into their worship, adding two actions to the service, the kiss of peace (modern term = passing of the peace) and presenting their gifts unto the Lord (modern term = offertory). The first was an opportunity for a little soul searching, a mini lent before the weekly mini Easter. If anything was

found weighing upon the heart, here was a brief opportunity to go and be reconciled to that sister or brother. It is presumed that a person would only need to reconcile with a few (one or two), not the whole town. It was not an opportunity to show friendship to everyone, equally, with concern that no one was left out. The church provided a different opportunity for that, going forth to love our neighbor as our self (modern term = coffee hour + the rest of the week).

An opportunity follows this to give our gifts. For us this is primarily money, pledged or otherwise, but in other cultures and in poor communities, it may also involve food [for the needy]. The peace, thus taken from scripture, connected to the readings [scripture] and led to action, our presenting our gifts as we prepare to remember the gift Jesus gives us which we name and remember in the Eucharist.

St. Antony's and New Fellowship Church Agreement

Below is the building usage agreement we have with New Fellowship Church.

Exhibit A

General Rules

- Saint Antony's Church (SAC) will contact New Fellowship Church (NFC) to schedule specific times and events not outlined below.
- SAC will have keys to the buildings and will ensure the buildings are secured when leaving, unless NFC is still
 occupying the building.
- SAC will have a unique code for the alarm system and will arm the system when leaving, unless NFC is still
 occupying the building.
- SAC may use a portable A-frame sign or banner at the entrance of the driveway to advertise their worship services.
- SAC may use the southeast basement room as an office and to store equipment, and will have a key to the room. The southwest main floor room will remain SAC's secretary's office.

Weekly Schedule

Sunday

- The sanctuary will be used by SAC from 7:00am to 10:00am and by NFC from 10:00 until 12:00pm. There may be some crossover between 10:00am and 10:30am as SAC clears the sanctuary and NFC sets up for their service that will start promptly at 10:30am.
- The hall will be used by SAC from 8:00am to 12:00pm, then NFC from 12:00pm to 2:00pm.
- The basement will be used by SAC from 8:00am to 9:00am, then NFC from 9:00am to 10:00am, then SAC again from 10:00am to 12:00pm. SAC will ensure the basement is available at 9:00am sharp so NFC may start adult Sunday school.
- The portable may be used by SAC from 7:00am to 10:00am. NFC will share the portable with SAC from 9:00am to 10:00am to conduct youth Sunday school [note that this will negate a quiet hour].

Tuesday

• NFC will use the Sanctuary and Hall between 6:00pm and 8:30pm.

Thursday and Friday

NFC will use the Sanctuary and Hall between 6:00pm and 9:00pm.

Other days and times will generally be available for SAC, but needs to be scheduled with NFC as noted above to confirm.

Scheduling Events

When planning events or meetings at the church, please check with the secretary, Linda Robuck, to make sure that your time and place are available when you want it. Some events, especially Saturday events, will need to be approved by New Fellowship Church first.

No events will be booked in the Parish Hall, Church or basement on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday evenings. You may use the modular at those times if it is available.

Transition

As our continuing saga of building a new church building continues, we all need to keep communications open and ongoing. The transition from this building to our new building happens in stages which will include: 1) packing materials we do not need to use until we are in the new facility; 2) recycling or donating items we are not using now and will not use later; 3) discarding accumulated minutia which is taking up space; and 4) making decisions about storage and handling of materials.

As days, weeks, and months pass, we are all on call to help as best we can. One parishioner has volunteered a garage, another volunteered rented storage, others have worked at church to box materials for storage. If you have any items at church which are personal, please take them home. We do not want to pack or discard them and create angst. Questions will arise and answers will be given when possible.

The good news we received from the meeting with the county will press our ability to be ready for changes. New Fellowship is most happy to help us and be accommodating, but we are now sojourners using their facility. We can adapt. So, keep your flexibility intact.

Kairos - God's Special Time

On Saturday, March 11th, many things were happening in the life of St. A's. We were serving at the Lord's Neighborhood Diner. Others were helping St. A's take the next step in a year of transition, packing some of the things in the parish hall, narthex, and basement. Still others were participating in the first of several team formation meetings that will prepare the team for Kairos 60 at WSR (Washington State Reformatory).

The next day Fr. Bill gave words to what we experienced. He was speaking about Abram stepping out in faith when called to leave his family and homeland to go to a new place God would show him. It also speaks of stepping out to serve a warm meal to people we don't know and doing it in a kitchen that is not our own. St. A's is looking to move to a place God has shown us.

In Kairos, we are looking to share our faith and the love that God has given us. It takes faith (though they are not likely to call it that) for the people inside WSR to change their ways and follow the rules. When they do, they become eligible to participate in the programs. The Kairos weekend is one of the religious programs. Again, for some of them, it takes an act of faith to take a chance on hearing a message about God. (Others are seeking to return to something they knew before they made some bad choices.) During the Kairos weekend, we share a prayer wheel (shaped as four 24-hour clocks) with first names (just first names) shown at the times when people are praying for them. While it would be overwhelming for all of us to physically practice Matthew 25:36 (visit the prisoner while in prison), we can pray. Are you willing? The weekend is April 27-30. The prayer vigil sign-up sheet and a list of things to pray for are available; please see the current location for signup sheets.
