Vicar's Voice

I'm glad to say that we have two people at St. Antony's who are in the process of discernment for holy orders. Bill Thaete, our deacon intern, is scheduled to be ordained a vocational deacon at Convention in October, and Shane Carlson has been nominated by the Bishop's Committee to become a postulant for the priesthood.

By virtue of our baptism, all Christians are called to be followers of Jesus Christ. All of us have a unique mission that utilizes our gifts and our personalities. "All baptized people are called to make Christ known as Savior and Lord, and to share in the renewing of his world." (BCP, p. 531)

In addition, some people are called to take up ordination as priests, deacons, and bishops. In the Episcopal Church, we have a thorough vetting process known as discernment. Anyone who feels called to be ordained must go through a long and rigorous process to test their calling.

The process begins with participation in a discernment groups in the local parish. The rationale for these groups is that discernment is best done by those who know the person within the parish. Our diocese requires two discernment groups, one for general discernment of gifts followed by a second discernment to see if the call is for ordination.

If the individual is given a green light by the local discernment groups, they must be nominated by the Bishop's Committee or Vestry and approved by the parish priest. Then they may be invited by the bishop to a discernment weekend where, with other aspirants, they are questioned at length by the members of the Diocesan Commission on Ministry. In addition, they are asked to supply voluminous information about their spiritual journey, their background, health, finances, and it goes on and on.

After the weekend, they may be told "no," "not yet," or "yes." Those who are given a "yes" may be invited to a personal interview with Bishop Rickel, who is the one who makes the final decision about conferring the status of Candidate and entering into the final phase toward ordination, which may require years of further education such as seminary.

As you can see, it's not a quick or easy process. In fact, some would say our discernment process is too rigorous and lengthy. Many people have submitted themselves to the process with a good heart and the best of intentions, only to be told "no" after a lengthy process. It takes considerable inner work to recover from such a disappointment.

So I hope you'll support Bill and Shane in their quest for holy orders. We'll keep them in our prayers as they move through the process, asking for God's guidance and direction for their life's calling.

People's and Bishop's Warden musings

Mutual Ministry Review

I wish to express my thanks and the thanks of the entire Bishop's Committee (BC) to everyone who took the time to complete and return a survey. This year we received more than half of the returns on the last day, dramatically changing the picture from the 2016 report. For 2017, 135 Mutual Ministry Review surveys went out, 45 surveys returned (33.3%). Last year's return rate was 31.4%.

In the Welcome and Fellowship section, the BC took note of several things including:

- A significant increase in the rating for "I have invited others to visit our church" the average increased by 10%,
- Twenty percent (20%) had no-opinion or didn't know about St. Antony's reputation in the community (identical to 2016's rating).
- There was a fair amount of discussion regarding comments like "St. Antony's seems to be 2 congregations." After discussing features of our three different Sunday services (Rite 1, Rite 2 and the evening Contemplative Prayer service) we came to the conclusion that we need to be multiple congregations if we are going to meet the needs of as many of God's people as possible. We also noted that we can do more to work together and we will look into this.

In the Involvement section we noted most responses have the same average this year as last. Notable differences were:

- "If I had a concern about something in this church, I would know where to take it" and "I know how to get involved here." Both show favorable increases in the average response.
- Comments in this section included "it would be important to have a list of current ministries and programs that we are promoting." Our Welcoming commission offered the brochure that they prepared earlier this year to meet this need. Copies of this brochure are available in the narthex.

In the Worship and Prayer section significant changes in the average response were seen for the question for healing prayer (up 18%) and the question regarding a mid-week service (up 8%). We discussed our current mid-week service offerings: Son-shine, contemplative (although this has moved to Sunday evening), and Wednesday evening.

Comments in the Worship and Prayer section focused on time constraints of the Sunday services, the sermon, liturgy, and a desire for more bible study "perhaps a few at different times throughout the week!"

In the Programs and Ministries section averages stayed within 2/10th of the results from 2016. The comments that drew attention were focused on doing more with adult education and doing more outreach.

In the Leadership section some of the averages were up and some were down; nothing moved more than 3/10th of an average point. Comments include: "I don't know of conflict" and "a great group of people."

In the Vision and Mission section the averages showed very little change from last year (1/10th of an average point was the largest). Comments here include:

- "I'd like to see us have a larger footprint in the community"
- "at least I think I know what the mission statement is"
- "excited for the future"
- "I believe we are one of the few 'traditional' churches that will still be thriving in 10 years."
- A few people didn't know that the mission statement can be found on the back of the newsletter and would like us to make it more visible on the website.

In the Short Answer section we gained insight into your vision and the various commissions will be using this information as they plan. Some of these short answers for how the new building will make a difference were:

- "better equipped to sponsor (or support) community events"
- "it won't, only the people can"
- "we should be able to add more programs and events to bring people to St. Antony's"
- "people will see what we are doing trying to grow and participate in our community and will want to be a
 part of St. A's".

There are two versions, the 2017 MMR report (a.k.a. the traditional report, 10 pages), and the comparison report (compares 2016 with 2017, 19 pages).

Construction has started! The early parts of the construction for the new church facility have begun. Starting July 17, the survey for the foot print of the building and the road realignment were completed. Construction equipment will be on site to begin moving dirt and making ready for all portions of the construction to begin. Let's watch our new church grow!

At the July 23 Sunday service Sarah Rogers and I shared the in-gathering of the Capital Campaign money is on target with only \$90,000 remaining to come in by the end of the year. What fantastic support and generosity by the congregation. Also, we made an announcement that is very exciting and appeared to be well received by the members in attendance. In previous articles you have heard mention of the "Picnic Shelter". Since this portion of our project has so many other possible uses we are now re-branding the name to the "Event Shelter". There are so many activities that may take place in the Event Shelter, Weddings, concerts, church services, pot lucks and many other social events. This will be a facility that allows St. Antony's to reach out into the community by providing a location for community events. Now what makes this more exciting is how this Event Shelter project has come together. It started as a suggestion by our architect-Steve Rice. He was having trees removed from his property and so he donated all the logs to be cut into timbers for use in the Event Shelter. He is also donating the architectural design. Our contractor-Bruce Berkimer feels the shelter is such an asset to our new facilities that he is donating all the labor to construct the shelter. What great gifts! There are items that will need to be purchased for construction. The expected cost to construct is approximately \$54,000. But now there is fantastic news. The shelter project and what it may do for St. Antony's outreach has the attention of a member of the community. This person has offered to match every \$100 donated toward the shelter up to \$25,000. Let's raise the needed money in the next few months to fund the shelter project. There is a small picnic basket in the Narthex of the church. With the basket are special pledge cards for donation to the shelter. You may give a one-time gift or spread your gift over the next 6 months. Be sure to write on your check(s) or envelope "for Event Shelter".
