Kairos

As Lent approaches, some of us are preparing to share the Gospel with those in prison. I (Charles Smith) will be doing that and I invite you to join me. There are many ways to be part of the gospel call found in Matthew 25:36c "I was in prison and you visited me." I would like to focus on just two as we begin Lent. The first is the obvious, go inside the prison as part of the Kairos 62 team, April 19-22. If you are interested in doing this, either on the team or to attend just the closing ceremony, please let me, Charles Smith, know so I can connect you with those who can make the arrangements.

The other is to share God's love with the participants through agape. This comes in several forms, the one I will mention here is personal agape, this is hand written letters of encouragement to the 42 participants. Typically the letter begins 'Dear Brother in Christ'. All 42 letters are hand written, no copies, because of the powerful message of love it sends to receive an original, hand written letter. Please sign each letter with your first name, and put each letter in its own envelope, but do not seal them - they are reviewed by prison security. These can be given to me; Charles Smith and I will turn them in along with my own letters.

What does that have to do with Lent? There are 40 days in Lent (not counting Sundays) and a need to write 42 letters. I have to turn the letters in April 7 (the first Saturday after Easter day), so that works out to one letter a day - if you are looking for something to take on as this year's Lenten discipline.

News from the Little Sisters of Saint Clare

With a new focus of encouraging Listening Hearts* in our church communities, the Little Sisters of St. Clare have been experimenting with small group work inviting folks to sit and listen to each other to help discern God's will. The questions we bring can be anything from our lives that we want to explore. One woman is discerning a call to the community of the Little Sisters of Saint Clare and asked two Sisters to sit with her to explore this. Another woman asked for a small circle to hold her over time while she makes some much needed changes in diet and exercise.

The first weekend in January, our Mother Guardian, Sister Dedra Ann Bracher, was the convener of the Diocesan HYC held at Black Diamond Camp near Auburn, WA. Mother D chose as a theme for the convocation, "Pieces of the Puzzle." Early in the weekend, each teenager was asked to consider an important question they are now personally considering or puzzling over. Throughout their time together, pieces were revealed in consecutive study sessions about how to enter into authentic discernment about their questions.

At noon on Saturday, four LSSC Sisters, arrived at the camp by Mother D's invitation. We enjoyed conversation at table with the HYC community during lunch and then one Sister was assigned to each of four small groups to retreat to a quiet spot. There under the facilitation of the Sister, the pieces of the puzzle that had been discussed were brought together and crowned by a final piece: the development of a Listening Heart in group discernment. The principles of this kind of listening were discussed. Then, after a period of silence, some of the participants found the courage to present their important question to the group. All listened practicing the Listening Hearts guidelines. Careful, open questions were asked of the speaker by group members. The process went deep very quickly as some really difficult issues emerged. It was clear that all members of the circle learned by being part of the process as speaker, a listener or both. It felt like a sacrament. What a blessing it was to me personally to be part of this experience.

In February the LSSC Community is looking forward to a gathering of all members (Friends, Companions, Postulants, Novices and Sisters) in Poulsbo where we will meet for brunch at Elmer's Restaurant and then travel a short distance to a lovely bed and breakfast facility for a quiet afternoon of prayer and to consider some questions that will be offered for our discernment. Of course, we will be engaging our Listening Hearts.

We are on Sabbatical Too!

At the annual meeting on January 20th, Bill did a presentation explaining in greater detail the opportunities provided by the Lilly Grant. Below is a summary of what was presented and the discussion that followed.

The sabbatical is a three to four-month period when the vicar can step away from his regular routine for a time of renewal. His expenses during that time and the cost of a supply priest are fully funded up to \$50,000 by the grant from the Lilly Foundation. Of that amount \$15,000 may cover sabbatical activities done by the congregation.

Bill plans to take the sabbatical during the summer of 2019. At that point we will have been in our new church building for about a year. While he is away, it will be good time for us, as a congregation, to examine who we are in our new location and how we want to continue bringing God's word to the surrounding community. As Father Scott suggested: "We are on sabbatical too!".

Many suggestions for sabbatical activities were offered by those attending the annual meeting:

- Host presentations by other outreach organizations. Chaplains on the Harbor and Seafarers were mentioned as examples.
- Have a facilitator guide us with the following:
 - Review our Mission and Vision statements
 - ♦ Look at the Diocesan vision, how the diocese sees us and their vision for St. A's, how we see ourselves and our vision for St. A's (has it changed now that we are in the new building?)
 - Determine our needs
 - ♦ Discuss our involvement in our community; past, present and in the future
 - Discuss how to make St. A's more inviting to our community
 - ♦ Talk about our plans for phase 2 and the barn
- Create an area in the church such as the side chapel for contemplation and prayer
- Promote activities that will attract youth to our church such as soccer or recitals.
- Connect with people from other parishes
- Develop our own lay leadership. Two examples were offered: EfM, Diocesan Ministries
- Go on a church retreat to strengthen our parish community
 - ♦ Play, pray, and stay together
 - Weekend (Friday through Sunday). Fort Worden, St. Andrew's House, other?
 - ♦ Fun times + prayer time (morning or evening prayer Saturday, compline, Sunday service)
 - ♦ Time to get to know each other in a different setting

We want to focus our activities during the sabbatical toward enhancing our connection with each other and the community. The Lilly Grant committee would greatly appreciate having a couple of people help us tailor the list with that in mind. In March we will also need a couple of volunteers to review the grant application and provide comments. It is due in mid-April.

If you have any further suggestions or questions or are willing to volunteer, please contact any member of the Lilly Grant committee.

Education for Ministry is a program available to us at St. Antony's that gathers a small group (6-12) to study and pray together to give knowledge and skill to participate in many kinds of church ministry. We are blessed with at least three trained EfM mentors: Charles Smith, Cris McCarty, Kathy Little. If any of our new members at St. Antony's are EfM graduates/former mentors, please let one of us know!

Last year, Cris and Kathy were co-mentors of an EfM group that met at St. Paul's. We decided to focus on bringing EfM to St. Antony's this year and almost succeeded but at the last minute two participants had to withdraw, leaving us with fewer than our required minimum of 6. That's OK. We trust that God has a plan here. Perhaps with the busyness of moving to a new church building, we were being invited to wait.

Looking forward to starting the study program in the Fall in our new digs, we would like to start gathering interested folks to meet in an informal study group on a regular basis this Spring. Day, time, frequency of meeting and place are all to be decided. If you are hearing EfM call, please speak to one of us. We will start gathering as soon as we hear enough interest. I was looking through my personal journal this morning and came across an entry I made in June of 2015 after a year I served as an EfM mentor, reading Church History with the Year Three participants. I wrote:

The Gifts of EfM to me this year.... "I regained the ability to read with speed and comprehension. I gained a perspective of the history of the church that has matured me in my faith journey. It has given me deep permission to hold Reason equal with both Scripture and Tradition making sure that three legged stool upon which the Episcopal Church rests. Understanding of symbolism in used in scripture and tradition are deepening within me. My ability to discern spiritual things has deepened and broadened. My love for the church has increased as I see it through new eyes - with compassion and gratitude. How I hold the concept of "Truth" has changed and grown. I am so grateful!"

There are so many helpful and healthful aspects of the EfM program. I hope this offering inspires participation.
