Vicar's Voice

If someone were to ask you what the purpose of St. Antony's is, what would you say? It some ways it seems obvious: "We're supposed to be the Episcopal Church in this part of the world." But if we dig a little deeper, the purpose of a church is harder to define.

Our mission in a nutshell is, "Gather, Grow, and Go." We gather each Sunday, we are nourished in the faith, and we go out to do the work of God in the world.

But what is involved in that big overarching statement? I've been thinking about it and I've come up with a few ideas. I hope you'll look at them and see if you would add to, change, or delete some of these statements:

The purpose of St. Antony's is:

- To support one another as members of a church family
- To raise our children in the Christian faith
- To seek God's presence when we come together as a church family
- To worship with the dignified and meaningful words of the Episcopal Prayer Book
- To seek God's blessing, strength, and forgiveness in the Eucharist
- To learn and grow in the Christian faith
- To bring other people into God's community of love and faith
- To serve those in need and show God's love to others
- To witness to God's justice in our society and protest injustice

What do you think our mission is? And do you think it will change as we move to our new location? How can we best accomplish our purpose as a church?

Are we currently organized in the best way to carry out our mission, or are there changes we could make to be more effective and faithful? If we grow, how will that change the way we are organized as a church? Do we need to plan for growth?

This fall we'll administer our annual Mutual Ministry Review, and it's a good time for us to think about our purpose as a church. The more aware we are of our purpose, the more effective we can be and the more meaningful our life as a church can be. I hope you'll think about these things and offer your thoughts to me and to the members of the Bishop's Committee.

A Garden for God

Saint Antony's is at a great and exciting intersection as preparations are made to move to our new church building. Yes, we have had a few setbacks and our time line has changed, but we are moving forward. God's new home is real wood and steel rather than a dream and hope on paper. It is within our reach and only a few months away.

One of the dreams and plans for Saint Antony's new home was a memorial garden. I like to think of it more as a garden for God. Although a dream, it has no description or purpose outlined in the plans. It is simply the words 'memorial garden' as a placeholder in the plans. If asked what those words mean, there could be many, many different answers. It is now time to dig in, explore and discern just what those words mean for Saint Antony.

Before we begin discussing size, location, plants, irrigation, and other specifics, more important questions must be answered. First, what is the purpose of this garden and does it support Saint Antony's mission statement? Second, how will the garden carry out the intended purpose? Third, who will benefit from the garden? And fourth, what value would this garden bring to the people it benefits?

These are not easy questions to answer and not just for the gardeners in our community. They are questions for the entire family of Saint Antony. Answering these questions will be the difference between creating a purposeful place of perpetual beauty or a pretty space that is soon forgotten and becomes an eyesore.

The first meeting to discuss and explore these questions for the memorial garden will be held Monday, August 27, at 11:00 AM. Two more exploratory meetings will be held at later dates to ensure that input is gathered from many of Saint Antony's people rather than a few. I hope you will take some time to consider these questions and attend this first meeting.

The Power of Prayer

He was one of Jesus' little bothers and according to the Gospels a doubter of Jesus. But within just a few short years he was transformed into a powerful man of God and first Bishop of the Church in Jerusalem. Although his name was James, he was loving called "Old Camel Knees" by many because of the callouses on his knees from spending so many hours in prayer. Paul went on his missionary journeys to convert the Gentiles, Peter went to Rome to bear witness and start a new church there, but it was James who stayed home and shepherded the church in Jerusalem. It was from there that he wrote a little letter with a lot of wisdom for the whole church.

James addresses many important issues of the day; How to handle trials and temptations; how God's people should be quick to listen and slow to speak - The importance of controlling your tongue and refraining from gossip; Avoid judging those less fortunate than ourselves - how our works of charity for God are a manifestation of our faith in action; and, James wrote about how the prayer of faith can change the lives of believers and those they love. James penned:

¹³ Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. ¹⁴ Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. ¹⁵ And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven. ¹⁶ Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective.

James 5:13-16

From these three verses James was giving the Church a new sacrament - the rite of Healing and Intercessory prayer, and the Episcopal Church has carried on that sacrament in our Prayer Book to this day under the title of "Ministration to the Sick".

St Antony is very blessed to have a group of elders (not necessarily in age, but in the power of prayer) to pray over us and those we love, for help in our times of trouble, need and sickness, or as the Prayer Book says, those troubled in mind, body or estate. They are Kathy, Olivia, Aina, Bill, Carolyn, , Maggie, Sylvia, Bill, Tovi, Emori, Beth and Declan. Each carries a vial of the holy oil of healing which you, the people of St Antony prayed over on Pentecost 2017. As one body we came together and asked God to bless the oil that it may represent the healing power of God's Holy Spirit in this sacrament and commissioned these people of prayer.

We are among you in the congregation. You will often see us with a colored cross with a descending dove around our neck. It's our signal that we are a part of Saint Antony's Healing and Intercessory Prayer group, Or HIP-sters as I like to think of them.

Tap us on the shoulder, ask us to pray for you or someone you love. We'll go over to the modular, where it's quiet. We'll anoint you with the oil of healing and ask you these simple words, "How may we pray for you?" Tell us your needs, your troubles, if you are sick, or just want to pray for someone you love. We will lay our hands on you and pray that God will work his will into your life and meet your need. We have seen miracles we and the quiet comfort of a loving God raising up his people who ask.

Remember what James says, "The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective.


