Vicar's Voice

I think I can speak for everyone when I say that this Coronavirus pandemic has gone on too long! We are all thoroughly sick of the restrictions that we have put ourselves under – the social isolation, the mask-wearing, the ban on travel. The only hope we have is a vaccine and we're waiting for the vaccine like children waiting for Christmas.

Waiting. That's the theme of the season of Advent. In Advent we wait for the coming of Christ, both the first coming in Bethlehem and the second coming at the end of time. Advent is a time of preparation and anticipation as we hear Isaiah telling us to prepare the way of the Lord, and as we wait with Mary for the birth of her holy child.

Advent and Christmas are usually times when we gather in close proximity, singing Christmas carols elbow to elbow, crowding around the Christmas tree, sharing egg nog and cider near the fireplace. We want to be together in cozy rooms like Mary and Joseph and the animals were gathered in the manger scene in Bethlehem.

But this year we'll have to be content with a more restrained and distanced Advent. We wait for the coming of the vaccine like we wait for the coming of Christ. It just takes time, patience, and acceptance.

Mary waited for nine long months of pregnancy for her holy child to be born. During those months she must have thought a lot about the message of the angel Gabriel who told her that the Holy Spirit would come upon her and she would conceive and bear a son. She waited with patience and hope.

This Advent and Christmas we'll be waiting, too. A vaccine is like a shield against an enemy, a force of protection against an adversary, and we're waiting with patience and hope. But the birth of our Savior is an even greater vaccine against the powers of darkness and the threat of evil, and we wait with faith, believing that God is with us.

So I hope that this Advent and Christmas, although uniquely different from previous years, will bring us renewed faith and deeper trust in God.

Advent 2020...A Reflection

What good is it to me if Mary is full of grace if I am not also full of grace? What good is it to me for the Creator to give birth to the Son if I do not also give birth to him in my time and my culture? Meister Eckhart (c.1260-1328)

The Season of Advent is a beautiful season in the Church year and, I think, it may be my favorite. With all that goes on around me, I might tune out the noise of the world intentionally. Through music, art, projects, books, I make plans to celebrate the birth of the Christ child, and that often brings a sense of pondering. What might this process be called: anticipation; preparation; waiting? This year, a pandemic may be a good time to pause, breathe and reflect.

The Collect for the First Sunday in Advent is also my favorite in the Church year: "Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness, and put on the armor of light..." (BCP, p211). We are to put on and wear the armor of light so that we might assist in broadcasting the Light of Christ in our world. It is the light to the shadows of our hearts, the shadows that dwell in our inner sacred space. It is a space that may need tending; a space that seeks to more fully know God's love and waits to celebrate the birth of God's Son. It may be a time to reflect on our inner spiritual journeys. Reading, journaling, listening are just some of the tools that can be used; and, speaking with others to hear their stories. When were you first aware of God? How did that awareness grow? Did/do you have a parent, a priest/pastor, mentor, a friend who has walked part of your faith journey with you? How does the awareness of the Holy continue to grow; what nourishes it?

In reflecting together, stories bloom and understanding deepens. Gatherings are not possible through quiet days or retreats this Advent. Yet, perhaps, we can phone a friend, send an e-mail, Chat or ZOOM, or in some other way inquire into deeper meaning of the stories we have known for so long. This year, 2020, is asking for and needing Light. In our concern for our neighbors and ourselves, for those struggling with job losses, health issues, uncer-

tainty, homelessness, how might our individual as well as collective Lights shine.

Our Safe and Healthy Holidays

As we move into the holidays it is important that we all understand that our separation today will lead to our ability to gather safely in the future. Our love for one-another is expressed by our concern for others health and safety. Please join me in understanding our current pandemic and avoid possibly spreading COVID-19. Here is some helpful information.

About COVID-19

Infection with COVID-19 can cause illness ranging from mild to severe and, in some cases, can be fatal. - Symptoms typically include fever, sore throat, cough, shortness of breath, fatigue, muscle aches, or new loss of taste or smell.

According to the CDC, symptoms of COVID-19 may appear in as few as 2 days or as long as 14 days after exposure.

The virus is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person, including:

- 1. Between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet).
- 2. Through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs.
- 3. It may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes, but this is not thought to be the primary way the virus spreads.
- 4. People are thought to be most contagious when they are most symptomatic. However, there is growing evidence of transmission risk from people without symptoms or before the onset of recognized symptoms.

Advent & Christmas 2020 November 30, 2020

Happy Advent and Merry Christmas:

As the church begins a new year (advent) and we prepare for the holy season of Christmas, I want to give thanks for some of the blessings of 2020 by name. Let me begin with you! Thanks to your support, both in prayer and physical support, I was able to enter the mission field in February.

Prison Ministry

Three of the people who were eager to begin a prison ministry were still involved when I arrived. I was able to join them for three weeks, visiting the prison, then the corona virus lockdown began.

I am thankful for how the Lord turned the lock-down into a blessing. Several people started expressing interest in prison ministry. Since groups of up to five were allowed, we began holding orientation on prison ministry. When these were complete we began team-a, team-b team meetings. When the limit increased to ten we were able to meet as a whole team.

God has blessed us by making us a team and developing Bible study materials so our work in the prison will be more consistent and build upon itself.

Recently, God has been growing our numbers again. We are now 16 on paper; however, only part of that number shows up on any given week. In February that could stop us, but now we go forward in His name.

Computer Skills

I knew this was written into my 'job' description for visa reasons. God has bigger plans.

Shortly after arriving I retrieved the computer skills training files from my computer backups so the Ray's (the other missionaries in Koboko) could use the typing portion in their home school. They decided to use the whole thing and asked me to write the last 10 lessons and update everything to the current version of Microsoft Office.



God is blessing me with open doors and opportunities to build relationships through interest in computer skills.

- I have been able to build relations with my neighbors by teaching computer skills. I am also learning some Kakwa in the process.
- The refugees along the boarder, particularly those in Mugujai knew me as a helper for discipleship. Now they are learning a new skill and plan to share it with others when they have learned the basics.

- God is using computer skills to build my relationship with the leaders of the Charismatic Church too. This class began in October.
- Thanks be to God for additional contacts and opportunities to share. This includes IPAD school and working with missionaries in Adjumani to provide computer skills to six Bible College campuses.

Face Masks

When I bought my face mask the Government requirement to wear them was looming, but the date of their promised distribution (to Ugandans) was delayed (again). The government distribution was a response to large segments of the population saying they cannot afford face masks.

I mentioned this in a Zoom meeting and God moved several people to make a special donation for face masks. Together we made a total of seven distributions of face masks to segments of the population (refugees, prisoners) that the government face masks will/did not reach (Bugutu prison, Koboko hospital, Children's Ministry, & Mugujai).

St. Antony's Land Use plan by Bill Fulton


How will we use the seven acres of land our church is placed on, and what areas will be designated for future activities? Those are questions the Bishop's Committee has been working on.

At its last meeting the Bishop's Committee used a proposed plan drawn up by Deacon Bill to discuss various uses of the property. After discussion, it was decided to make the plan available so everyone can have a look at it. A link to the plan is on the front page of St. Antony's website.

Some of the areas designated by the plan were included in the architect's drawings for the new building, such as the Phase 2 building, future parking lot space, required landscaping, and the drainfield for the septic system. Other areas in the plan were chosen with an eye to future projects like the community garden, the memorial garden, a picnic area, and a playground for the children.

The BC made one change in the original plan, which was to move the area for the community garden to the rear of the church, near the barn where tools may be stored.

There are no specific plans for the designated areas yet, but the plan reserves space for them in case they're approved in the future. So the land use plan is really just an orderly way for us to plan for future use. I hope you'll look over the plan on the website and let the members of the Bishop's Committee know your thoughts.


