#### Vicar's Voice

Recently I attended a preaching conference sponsored by the Episcopal Preaching Fellowship. One of the presenters was Judith Fentress-Williams, a professor at Virginia Theological Seminary, who spoke about the deep grief our country is plunged into, and how the scriptures speak to that grief.

In the last year we've all grieved the loss of human touch as the pandemic has forced to isolate ourselves. We've grieved the loss of black lives, we lament the violence at our nation's Capitol Building and we mourn the intense divisiveness of our national political life. And many of us have our own private grief as well.

But Professor Williams reminded us of the resources we have in the Bible and the Prayer Book to address this grief. The scriptures, particularly the Psalms and the prophets of the Old Testament, give voice to our grief and remind us that God never abandons us.

In the wisdom of the Prayer Book, we are given the season of Lent to enter into the passion and death of Christ to experience loss and grief. Then, after hitting bottom on Good Friday, we're lifted to the joy of Easter on Sunday morning. God never fails.

On Ash Wednesday, February 17, we'll offer ashes in the church parking lot to anyone who would like to drive through and pick them up at 1:00 or 5:00 pm. You may bring them home and smudge the ashes on your forehead as you watch the 7:00 Ash Wednesday service on our livestream.

Grief is a part of life but it doesn't have the last word. Only God has the last word. As we enter the season of Lent, I hope you'll experience the grief of Christ's passion and death as well as the joy of his resurrection. May God grant us the observance of a holy Lent.

#### Home Aid Bread

!Today's bread, in this article, might seem like a stone-ground rye with crunchy seeds in it, and it is intended as a !hearty supplement to your normal intake of nourishment.

In speaking of the Christian church we have been given biblical instructions on how to be "in the world, but not of it", and that is a tall order in today's monolithic government programs and ever changing management designs for peoples of the world to become united peacefully. For many reasons each of us can see the world in different ways, so it is difficult to arrive at a point of unity through our diversity of lifestyles and knowledge.

Perhaps the use of "Interpretive Charity" can be a guide for some of us, if it seems good to you. This means we take on, or practice, the ability to apply the most loving interpretation to actions and opinions of others. At times we can be in the dog house with other people, family and friends, because of our personal cynicism and criticism, and selfish inference that others ought to see and do it our way. We can become like a closed door to a possibly health-ier point of view. Yet we cannot overlook the truth or compromise on our virtuous teachings as we understand them to be.

In the past centuries a conversation, or discussion on points of view, may have included those polite mannerisms and vocal expressions that engage with others for beautiful moments of good communication. The Victorian Era was polished in that for the most part. To be a good listener was to hear the speaker and to retain composure even if you wanted to dismiss someone, and their argument or advice, because of who they are in your eyes. Stand tall and hold your ground, as they said.

It might be appropriate to say that today's conversations can seem like chatter and noise. We like hanging on to our own thoughts rather than be intruded upon by what we perceive to be anti or in opposition to our thoughts because it creates rough edges. Perhaps in a small rural European town the leaders can bravely shout "God Save The Queen," while the poor and hungry, mostly out of work citizens, cry out "WHY?"

Talk from our political leaders can (not necessarily do) put spins inwardly toward conformity toward an unquestioning allegiance to an authorized world view. In some ways this form of bad rhetoric is mere insidious because we can walk away from it believing that it was good. Some of it is smoothly decorated with comfortable phraseology current in the media.

So as Christians we do not need to join with the world in any nervous foreboding that overshadows the hope of our future. Those burdensome thoughts are simply tissues of fear that we can send away with our prayers and a loving unity with Christ Jesus. As it says in the Book of Revelation, He has the last word on absolutely everything.


There are two heals or ends to today's crusty rye bread loaf. Take heed not to toss them away.
