Dear People of St. Antony's,

Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

What a wonder filled Holy Week we had, and Easter Sunday was such a blessing. It was so good to see so many here. And the weather – God truly blessed us!

As I mentioned, there are so many people to thank for making Holy Week and Easter such blessed time. I won't try to list the names, as I know I will leave someone out; but please know that all you did is greatly appreciated.

I am planning on leaving the arrangement of the furniture in the church as it is through the Easter Season. It was interesting to see faces as people walked in! Some seemed excited, some not quite so sure, and a few didn't seem to like it. It's important that we have moments where we need to have our routines shaken a little. I love the stories like Jesus shaking things up in the temple, and St. Paul's conversion because we see how God can and will open us to new ways.

In my discussions with some who were involved with the design of our worship space, one of the reasons for the platforms was that they could be moved and rearranged. I realized that there has been very little movement of the furniture and so it was time! As I mentioned on Maundy Thursday, the Eucharist is the center of our life as Christians, thus the placement of the altar in the center of the church. I also believe it is important that we don't become so comfortable in our worship that we get to a point where we go through our actions and say our prayers and response without thinking about what we're doing and saying.

Transition times in congregations are like this. We often become so comfortable with the way things are, the way we've always done them, that sometimes we miss the opportunity and the possibility of how God might now be working in our lives, how we might not yet have fully realized all the potentiality of the gifts with which we have been blessed.

As we move fully into the Easter Season, I pray that we will all be open to the gift of new life in the Risen Christ. As our UCC sisters and brothers remind us, *God is still speaking*, let us be open to the promise of newness in our lives both individually and corporately as the people of Saint Antony's.

The assembled group will be broken out into smaller groups to further discuss the results. More information about this will be provided later. The important thing is to mark your calendars and try to be at this meeting.

Prayers of the People: A. Stebbing, Trinity Episcopal Church, Woodlands, TX

Jennifer Brown from the Diocesan Refugee Resettlement Office (RRO) attended the March Outreach meeting, and shared many ways refugees are being helped through their program. She offered to speak to our congregation about the RRO at an upcoming Sunday service, and identified a few current needs as rental assistance and teaching English. Jennifer could train volunteers to teach English to refugees, and lessons could be offered virtually (e.g. via Zoom). Outreach hopes to plan a St. Antony's fundraiser to support the RRO in the near future.

Last month the Outreach Team agreed to a \$300 donation to the Coffee Oasis and \$300 to Charles Smith to support his missionary work in Africa. There was discussion and endorsement of the BC plan to include a separate line item for Missionary work in the 2023 church budget (previously addressed at the March 2022 Bishop's Committee meeting). The Outreach team also agreed to continued monthly donations of \$100 to the Kitsap Community Resources (KCR) Kinship program through the end of the year. Here are some touching stories shared by a KCR case worker about how St. Antony's support of the Kinship program helped two families in Kitsap this year:

- (1) Great-grandmother obtained custody of her 1 year old great-granddaughter when the child's mother was incarcerated. A great-aunt, who had a full time job and home of her own, provided support to help raise the child who both women call 'their little blessing'. The great-grandmother had a severe decline in health, and the child's great-aunt had to give up her job to care for the family. KCR helped the aunt obtain a caregiving license, and she now resides with the child and great-grandmother, whose health has improved. The gift cards from St. Antony's the past year provided amenities for the household that KCR would have been unable to provide. The great-grandmother and great-aunt continue to care for their beloved, artistic 3 year old preschooler.
- (2) Grandmother has cared for her 10 y.o. granddaughter since birth. The grandmother lost a lucrative job following a serious medical problem, which required multiple surgeries. Due to medical bills, the family fell behind on rent and bills and lost their housing. They were living out of their car, and all their household possessions were stolen. The grandmother learned about Kitsap Community Resources, and obtained housing with their help. The gift card this family received from St. Antony's helped to supplement clothing and household items they needed. The grandmother's last surgery went well and she is on the mend.

Next Outreach Team meeting will be via Zoom on Tuesday, May 10th at 7 pm - Zoom invitation will be sent the day of the meeting. Ideas are needed for a fundraiser to support the Refugee Resettlement Office, as well as folks interested in planning this event. All are welcome to attend.

The Lenten Food Drive was a big success - thank you! Sincerest appreciation to all who donated to the Central Kitsap Food Bank through food items or cash donations. Final tally of proceeds: 680 pounds of food, and \$800 in monetary donations. Your generosity makes a difference to those in need.

Ann Daniels says she had no trouble deciding which church she would attend when she and her husband (now deceased) moved from Seattle to Kitsap County after retirement in millennial year 2,000. St. Antony was the third stop in her search. With the friendliness she encountered, this "cradle Episcopalian" knew immediately "this was it." Moreover, on her second Sunday, a chance interchange solidified her choice. As she was standing in the narthex looking over some brochures announcing a scenic hike, Ann (having been raised in Minneapolis) commented that she'd "like to have done this when I was a kid," to which parishioner Ruth Lindstrom, standing beside her, replied, "Oh! But this is for adults. We'd love to have you join us." Now, many years later, Ann (usually accompanied by her faithful rescue dog Sophie) and Ruth continue to be avid "Tony's Trekkers."



Ann has been involved in many other aspects of church life. Several years ago while on the Bishop's Committee, she used her thirty-year work experience as an

accountant to fill the role of church treasurer. She has also devoted much time and energy to the Outreach Committee, Altar Guild and the Lord's Diner. She's a stalwart at scheduled work parties; even more significantly, on days when the weather is good, you can often find her solo-gardening - keeping the entrance to the church attractive and weed free.

Since childhood, Ann has had a passion for horses. She was ten when her family moved to Seattle. Somehow the move prompted her to beg her parents for permission to take riding lessons. Those lessons led to a lifetime of joy as she continued to practice the skills learned then. A highlight of her riding days occurred when she visited a friend in England who lived two blocks from the Ascot Race Track. While she didn't see any races, riding her friend's horse in nearby Windsor Great Park was a great thrill. Ann no longer enters horse shows herself, but she indulges her interest in all things equestrian through her daughters who are professionally involved in that field. Much of the travel she enjoys today is connected to accompanying them to horse shows staged throughout the country from Mexico to the Canadian border.

Her travel repertoire also includes a once-in-a-lifetime, do-it-yourself canal trip in France taken with other adventurous members from St. Antony.

Ann feels fortunate that most of her family (two daughters, two sons and six adult grandchildren) live in the area. All are physically and emotionally rooted in a house on Island Lake that became the family summer home beginning in the 1940's. Today it is still a very special family meeting place and Ann's unique, life-enriching abode.

What Is Planned Giving?

Planned giving encompasses a variety of ways that gifts can be made to the church from accumulated resources. It usually involves financial or estate planning; however, it is not reserved for the wealthy. Planned giving is a means by which anyone concerned with the wise use of his or her personal resources makes a considered choice about their ultimate disposition.

In general planned gifts are made through:

- + A Bequest in a Will or Trust
- + A Life Income Gift such as a charitable gift annuity, a charitable remainder trust, or a pooled income fund
- + Gifts of Special Assets (real estate, closely held stock, life insurance, retirement accounts)

Planned giving establishes a way for a donor to provide for family members while remembering the church as well. It often enables the donor to provide more for his or her heirs and to make a larger gift than thought possible. It often reduces taxes as well.

Planned gifts can be designated for the church's general funds or endowments.

Planned gifts are either outright gifts (i.e., gifts of appreciated securities, real property, personal property, etc.) or deferred gifts (i.e., bequests, charitable gift annuities, charitable trusts).

Planned giving is one expression of the wise use of the personal resources God has entrusted to us.

All St. Antony's members who make provisions for a legacy gift in their Wills for our church become members of St. Antony's Legacy Society and automatically members of the Bishop's Society. Please contact Chris Crowson for additional information.

In May, one copy of our Diocese's "LIFE PLANNING MANUAL" will be available in the Narthex for each St. Antony family.

Outreach

The prison ministry team is diverse, praise God. However, it is not diverse enough. Currently one denomination dominates, and we are mostly make. od willing, we will become more diverse.

A high percentage of the team members are also attending Senior Secondary Schools. This would be the equivalent of Junior High School and High School (combined in one school) in the US. A few of the students are the same age as their US counterparts; however, most are older, well into their twenties. These team members also attend religious activities at their respective Senior Secondary Schools. One of the activities is the monthly gathering of all

Senior Secondary Schools at one place for prayer and worship. This is conducted by the local branch of the Scripture Union.

A few of these team members are working to introduce the prison ministry to the Scripture Union. As a result, we are now among the ministry groups that are invited to attend their Sunday afternoon, monthly prayer and worship gatherings at a hosting Senior Secondary School. Each of the ministry groups are introduced so the students can learn about programs and ministries outside of school they may want to get involved with after graduation (or between terms). The introduction to all the schools is why the students that are team members want the prison ministry to be part of these prayer and worships. It is an opportunity for God to make this ministry known and build the team.

At the end of March I was given the opportunity to share the message. There was very little human effort to coordinate the message with the testimony or with the announcements of the various ministry groups; however, God unified th message. In a time of school unrest the announcements, testimony, and message all pointed to keeping a calm peaceful school environment and working to achieve the best result possible as exams are coming.

Prison Ministry

The prison ministry team continues to work on Bible study materials for the gospel of Mark. We are eager to share the gospel with those in prison, but UPS (Ugandan Prison System) is only allowed to permit family visits (so far) in this post lock-down era. The leadership at the local prison expects to be permitted to allow ministry visits soon.



Computer Skills Ministry

The computer skills ministry is growing at two locations and finishing up at another. The Mugujai Mission Center is now hosting six students at a time on three computers (a 50% increase). The class in Birijaku is managing with two computers, foru people attend each week, others are in school and will return between terms, still others are waiting for an opportunity. A local reverend has also expressed interest in computer skills as a tool for completing his thesis.
