Dear Saints,

I can't help but keep thinking about the Annual Meeting held on the 12th. What a truly blessed day it was! It was great to have everyone gather for one service. It was so wonderful to have Canon Carla Robinson with us and to hear her wonderful words about Absalom Jones and her message.

I know I caught you off guard when I announced that my last day as your interim will be May 14th (if not before, should you call someone local who can start sooner). I wanted to give ample notice (3 months) but more importantly I feel that it is the right time. Victoria and I will be heading to France, for a trip we have been planning for over two years now, to celebrate my retirement from the UW. Between the questionable travel restrictions in 2021 and then the opportunity to serve as you interim, it wasn't a difficult decision to put the trip on hold at that time. I will be gone for five weeks which puts us close to the end of June and hopefully your new vicar will be here by then. I will be certain to work with the diocese and make sure that supply priests are scheduled if needed when I leave.

As you read this, we will have gathered for Ash Wednesday, and we will have begun our Lenten Journey. The reading for the First Sunday of Lent is about Jesus being in the dessert for 40 days and the temptations of Satan. Very few of us will ever be put to the test as He was; yet we all face temptations every day in our lives. This is one of the reasons I prefer the contemporary translation of the Lord's Prayer -- *and lead us not into temptation* compared to *save us from the time of trial* are much truer of our God. I do not believe God would ever lead us into temptation but I do know that God can and does save us from times of trials when we open ourselves to the Spirit.

And the beauty of belonging to a congregation, especially this one known as St. Antony's, is that we never need to face these challenges alone. The relationships you have with each other is something that should never be taken for granted; I can tell you that not every church experiences the sense of community you have built here. I have always been impressed and blessed by the experience of community I have found here. There's a great Gospel Song, *Never Alone*, (<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Lm_teJxqlVo</u>) that I truly believe reflects on the spirit of St. Antony's. Not only is our Savior always with us, but you are also with each other on your journeys.

My prayer for all of us during this season of Lent will be that, as we continue to journey together, that we will all be open to wherever the Spirit lead us and that we will always know in our hearts that we truly are never alone.

Getting to know you - verbal sketches of St. Antony parishioners

When Charles Smith was in HYC (the diocesan High-School Youth Churchmen program), some of his peers wondered if he was thinking of becoming a priest. Though his inclination at the time may have been in that direction, he went on to earn a BA at Seattle University with a major in Philosophy and a minor in Computer Science; later he added a BSc in Computer Programming at Griffin College.

In his post-graduate years, as in his formative ones, Charles was closely connected to church institutions and involved in ministry. Baptized as an infant, he grew up in Episcopal churches, mainly at St. Andrew's, Seattle. He began acolyting as a youth and continued doing so into adulthood when he also trained acolytes. Over the years, he served in multiple other positions: counsellor at Camp Huston, Sunday school teacher, Youth Group facilitator, delegate to Convention, Bishop Committee member (two-plus terms) and BC clerk for four years.

Charles also contributed his services outside of church circles - especially in Boy Scout programs. Starting as a Bear Scout in fourth grade, at eighteen he became an Assistant Scoutmaster and then progressed to Scoutmaster of a number of troops including one for a Jamboree. Along the way he earned numerous awards. Prized among them was one to which he was elected - the Order of the Arrow's Vigil Honor - bestowed on a scout for "distinguished service to others." That dedication to helping others was also exemplified later in his two-year Peace Corps service in The Gambia where, in addition to teaching computer and other classes, he trained a national scout leader training team. Charles remains a registered scout even today.

Discerning God's will in his life has always been his first priority. This desire led him, between 2007 and 2014, to earn certifications from both the Diocesan School of Ministry and Theology and from the Education for Ministry Program; in-between courses he did a four-month missionary stint in Dornakal, India.

Following these studies and his return from India, for ten years Charles was involved in local prison ministry through Kairos, a semi- annual, four-day weekend course in Christianity. In visits to the prison in Monroe, WA, he filled several roles: servant, table attendant, prayer coordinator, chapel coordinator and weekend leader. Ministry also included monthly prayer-and-share meetings and semi-annual full day reunions.

Throughout all these time-consuming commitments, Charles maintained regular jobs. He worked for Electronic Data Systems Corporation for thirteen years, spending five of them in Michigan and one in Oregon. Service in the Peace Corps followed. Upon return from The Gambia he worked as Senior Logistics Analyst for Mercury Ventures Logistics, dba Military Air Cargo Company in Port Orchard.

During his fourteen years with the company, Charles continued seeking to discern God's call on his life. It came as a call to the missionary field. Introduction to a missionary family who was on leave from South Sudan resulted in an invitation to join them when they returned - this time to Uganda which was becoming a refuge for Sudanese escaping their war- torn country. Prison ministry was also a growing need there. Following an exploratory three-week

survey trip to the region and prayer by everyone involved, Charles was invited to come to Uganda as a long-term missionary.

Covid, ebola outbreaks, and government regulations have been obstacles to overcome, but now, through the ecumenical "Truth Is Light Prison Ministry and Computer Skills Ministry," his service continues in faith.

Most of us have not felt the call to which Charles has responded, but through prayer and financial donations we can contribute to his dedicated efforts.

On Sunday, 26 February, at 11:45 am right after coffee hour following the 10:15 service at St. Antony's, Charles will be speaking and showing photos about his endeavors in Uganda. Please come to learn more about his ministry and to support him in his important work.

Charles Mission News

Greater Things

In verse 50 of chapter 1 of the gospel according to John, Jesus tells Nathanael, "You will se greater things than these." While reflecting on it, I realized I have!

1. When the President of Uganda ended all Corona virus restrictions in February 2022, I thought we would be allowed back into the prison. No. Family was allowed but we were not allowed until July.

When I arrived in 2020, I asked about needing formal recognition (permission) from UPS Headquarters (Uganda Prison System). I was told not unless we want to hold a special function. The offered in charge of Gbukutu Prison changed on January 1, 2022, and he wanted the letter from UPS Headquarters, but in July he agreed to let us begin in August. We were allowed for a couple of months and then we were locked out again. We were allowed for a couple of months and then we were told it was an Ebola precaution.

God moved another officer to tell us the truth. (Greater things are happening, normally we must initiate the contact and what we are told is limited.) The officer in charge had found others willing to share God's word. Now he choose to persecute based upon denomination. Truth is Light Prison Ministry is ecumenical. We were also told he could not deny us if we received permission from UPS headquarters.

After false starts, delays, and two trips across the country and back, our request for formal recognition was accepted. When we gave proof of this, the other officer provided her contact at UPS headquarters, the head of religious affairs for al USP. Contacting him resulted in a request for another trip across the country. This trip resulted in an in -person meeting wit the UPS chain of command. Getting a letter granting formal recognition and ending persecution after just a one-hour meeting. Greater things.

2. Now that we are back serving at Gbukutu Prison again, we are sharing the gospel every Thursday. The team that went the first week fo January 2023 came back excited. Fourteen prisoners gave their lives to Christ!

I was invited to join Kairos prison ministry in 2010. I learned that a 'Kairos weekend' program is open to all, believers and non-believers. Following the program, some of them have given their lives to Christ. It happened following the 'Kairos weekend' program. Sometimes we met them at other Kairos programs and could continue to worship with them. That was in the US. Here the decision to give there live to Christ does occur while we are ministering to them. I was not in Gbukutu prison on January 5th, but wow! Four percent of the prison population. Greater things. What a welcome back!

3. The Truth and Light Prison Ministry knew there was a second prison in Koboko district, but we wanted to wait until the prisons were open again and we had an introduction from the officer in charge of Gbukutu prison. We received that in August, before the "Ebola" lockout. The officer in charge of Lobule prison welcome us and has allowed us to continue even when the persecution at Gbukutu prison began.

Lobule prison is small but the turnout for our ministry is great. Frequently all or all but one of the seven prisoners attend. Including the Muslim. Now the Muslim is expressing interest in Jesus and wants a Christian novel to read. Must be Christian. Greater things. (We were permitted to give him the novel.)

<u>Thanksgivings:</u> 1. The prison ministry is back in Gbukutu prison (again). 2. I thank God for my financial and my prayer support teams. 3. No more Ebola in Uganda. <u>Prayer Requests:</u> 1. Please join me in praying about transport options for the prison ministry; what this will look like and how to finance it. 2. I will be in the US February 16 - May 13. I am looking for opportunities to share about my mission work.
