

Our Mission and Statement

My Sisters and Brothers,

The mission of St. Antony's is to be a loving and welcoming people who worship God, grow in Christ, and serve others: Gather, Grow, and Go!

We close our statement with a quick synapsis, Gather, Grow and Go; which brings me to a question. How can we as a church, the people, improve how we live into our Mission Statement?

How can we empower the **Gather** portion of our Mission Statement? **Gathering is inviting, Greeting, Orienting and Incorporating** our neighborhood, our community, and strangers by reaching out in love and fellowship. The first part of Gathering is **Inviting**, that involves having a welcoming presence in our neighborhood, building a relationship with our neighborhood, reaching out electronically to invite our neighbors, and inviting people in person. The next part of Gathering is **Greeting**. This means recognizing strangers and acknowledging visitors, extending welcoming's, helping visitors as to our practices and extending an invitation to coffee and fellowship. The third part of Gathering is **Orienting** by helping visitors understand the Episcopal Church. This can be as simple as suppling visitors with programs and helping them find a comfortable place to sit. Ensuring that visitors are familiar with our building and services we provide such as child care and rest room locations. The fourth part of **Gathering** is **Incorporating**, which is a deeper involvement in the social and faith-based activities of the church. This can take many avenues based on the new person in the community. Our call is to love and accept them into our community.

How can we empower the **Grow** portion of Mission Statement? Growing is transformation from a visitor to an active, participating and supporting member of the church. We hear this transformation from Paul's letter to the Romans; *"I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, on the basis of God's mercy, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable act of worship. Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect"*

This means living into our Baptismal Covenant as part of our local church community found in the Book of Common Prayer..

"Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers? I will, with God's help. Continued on next page

Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord? I will, with God's help.

Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ? I will, with God's help. Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? I will, with God's help. Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being? I will, with God's help."

How do we live into the **Go** portion of our Mission Statement? God sends us into the world over and over again to be God's own living presences in the world, to be His hands and feet to transform the world. God sends us into the relationships, communities, roles, and occupations in which we find ourselves. God asks us to learn what it means to live into reconciliation, peace, and justice with everyone we meet in the world. We are called to go into the world every time we celebrate the Eucharist and we repeat the Post Communion Prayer, "... Send us into the world in peace and grant us strength and courage to love and serve you with gladness and singleness of heart through Christ our Lord."

The closing line of our Mission Statement; **Gather, Grow and Go**, calls us into a stronger relationship with Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. I pray that each of us take this calling to heart and live into it.

To Choir or Not to Choir—That is the Question

Joann needs to be able to plan for the upcoming choir season. A determination will be made by September whether the choir will sing every month or only on Christmas and Easter (and possibly All Saints and Pentecost). All are welcome in the choir, so please consider joining this ministry if you enjoy singing.

In order to have a choir, Joann needs to know the level of commitment that choir members are willing to make. Please email Joann at organistjoann@gmail.com by August 31 to let her know: (1) if you plan to sing in the choir; (2) if you are willing to commit to regular rehearsals in order to be able to sing every month (details on this below); or (3) if you prefer the reduced rehearsal schedule of a Christmas/Easter choir.

In order to have a choir that sings on a monthly basis, we need to have large-enough group of choir members who are willing to:

- 1. Commit to rehearsing after the 10:15 Eucharist on the Sundays that Joann is the musician—usually twice a month (choir members will be given a schedule).
- 2. Leave coffee hour early in order to attend rehearsals on-time. Rehearsals begin no later than 11:45 AM and end at 12:30 PM.
- 3. Inform Joann in advance if unable to attend rehearsal or sing at Eucharist.
- 4. Arrive by 9:15 AM to rehearse on Sundays that the choir is scheduled to sing an anthem.

Joann realizes that choir members may need to miss an occasional rehearsal, but choir members do need to commit to making most rehearsals in order for St. Antony's to have a functioning choir. The purpose of choir rehearsal is to learn to blend as a group — and we can't do that unless there is a group. So, to paraphrase the song: "is you is, or is you ain't in choir?" Please let Joann know -all are welcome, it's a great time, and it's great fun to make music with others!



Notes from the Bishop's Warden

'The Summer Day', by Mary Oliver

Who made the world? Who made the swan, and the black bear? Who made the grasshopper? this grasshopper, I mean the one who has flung herself out of the grass, the one who is eating sugar out of my hand, who is moving her jaws back and forth instead of up and down who is gazing around with her enormous and complicated eyes. Now she lifts her pale forearms and thoroughly washes her face. Now she snaps her wings open, and floats away. I don't know exactly what a prayer is. I do know how to pay attention, how to fall down into the grass, how to kneel down in the grass, how to be idle and blessed, how to stroll through the field, which is what I have been doing all day. Tell me, what else should I have done? Doesn't everything die at last, and too soon? Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?

I don't always have the patience for poetry, instead wanting a quick and easy understanding of ideas. However, there is something about Mary Oliver's poetry that stops me in my tracks, and evokes a deep, soulful response an invitation to slow down, to open to wonder and abide in God's grace in the midst of everyday life. I hope these summer days are offering you opportunities to do just that.


In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. John 1

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. 1 John 4:16

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength. ...you shall love your neighbor as yourself." *Mark* 12:31-32

It is hard to fully explain why these three verses mean so much to me. It is clear that each moves me. The second was my father's favorite and I always feel a connection to him when I recite it. I know, too, that these three verses reach deep into my own spirituality, informing much of what 'religion' means to me, to my life, to my family and our place in this world.

When I ponder stewardship and its importance to me and to our congregation, I go to these verses. They settle my mind on the Word, the love that is God, and Christ's commandments for us to live that love in our relationship with God and with each other. This helps me better appreciate my feelings on stewardship – on my gifts of time, talent, and treasure – from a most meaningful perspective.

Resistance

Resistance? I mean to say God called me to Koboko, Uganda to join in the work he wants to (and is) doing here. Satan does not like it. Satan is trying to crate division where there should be unity.

Even so, God's work is continuing in the present, and will continue into the future.

The Resistance is showing up at Gbukutu prison. Satan has been trying different things to interfere with God's message. The latest has been to create strife between different ministries, Christian ministries.

Recently we were asked if we could provide a bible in the Lugbara language. Yes we can. We have provided two in the past, but we did not mention that. We sent the Lugbara bible with the team members selected to minister the next week. (We are limited in how many team members we can send per week.) The following day I received a message from the Deputy OC (Officer in Charge) saying that the prisoners rejected the bible because it is not a Catholic bible. I responded that when I went to buy the bible, I was told there is only one translation of the bible in Lugbara and only one translation in Kakwa. I have since asked others, who have said the same thing.

We are an ecumenical ministry seeking to share God's word with all, regardless of denomination. We also want to reach to those who do not currently believe. God is one and came for all of us. We seek to model that. There are forces at work in this prison that seek to make God a denominational thing. As a result, attendance has been going down. Prisoners are being encouraged to wait for the ministry they want to listen to, if any. Meanwhile we will continue to share the gospel with all that are willing to listen.

The resistance is showing itself in other forms, too, requiring extra work on the part of the Deputy Officer in Charge.

Some of the prisoners took it upon themselves to start tearing pages out of the King James Version bibles the UPDF (Uganda People's Defense Force) chaplain donated. Instead of seeking a bible with the additional books (apocrypha) they were damaging those they had. The Deputy Officer in Charge collected the desecrated bibles. She knows that what she was able to recover will be valued by other prsoners when this time of resistance is overcome. Meanwhile there are bibles, English (New American Standard Version or NASV, New Living, and Good News), Kakwa, and the first two Lugbara bibles that some of the prisoners are taking care of. These remain with those prisoners. Each week, we also leave a copy of our notes after sharing the next section of the bible study of the gospel of Mark. The officers make these notes available to those who are interested in using the bibles with respect.

Jesus did not surrender. The prison ministry God has called me to help develop and encourage is not surrendering. We are praying and going forward. I invite you to join that prayer.

<u>Thanksgivings</u>: 1. The Deputy Officer in Charge believes in the ministry of God and is working with us (and the other Christian ministries that visit that prison) for the glory of God. 2. The prison ministry team that God has called and their willingness to pray and move forward.

<u>Prayer Requests:</u> 1. Please join me in praying about transport options and how to finance it. 2. My work permit renewal is in process. I ask for prayers that it will be approved soon. 3.That the resistance will be overcome.

What is "Faith Formation?"

When I first joined the Bishop's Committee, I learned that each member was responsible for a different aspect of our parish life. I chose to take responsibility for Faith Formation, based on my own need to more deeply understand our faith.

Of course, the first question that came to mind was "What do we mean by Faith Formation? Why do we say "faith formation" rather than "faith learning?" Is "formation" about believing? Is it about knowing lots of theology, or learning to quote verses from the Bible?

For us as Christians, the beginning of formation is our baptism. We become members of the body of Christ at baptism, even when we are too young to know its meaning—God reaches out to us. When we, as adults, reaffirm our baptism, we are recognizing that the bond which God establishes in baptism is "indissoluble".

Many of us were Episcopalians before the 1979 revision of the Book of Common Prayer. While the "thee's" and "thou's" of the 1928 Prayer Book have a comforting familiarity, the 1979 revision of the Prayer Book involved great and passionate disagreement, still reflected in the two versions of the Lord's Prayer in common use through the Episcopal Church today. Must we really ask God not to lead us into temptation? As lay people, the theological arguments that led to the revision "save us from the time of trial" seem to be a hair-splitting argument among theologians—but is it really? In a time in our culture when so many of our young people no longer believe in formal religion, I often think about Marcus Borg's question to his atheistic students: "Tell me about the God that you no longer believe in?"

What does God require of us in this time of epidemic spiritual hunger and declining church attendance? What is the nature of the God in whom we believe? Is he a God who expects us to be followers of rules, with appropriate punishment if we fail to do so? Is he a "helicopter" God who hovers over us and approves of everything we do?

What does the Bible teach us? Is it the literal Word of God, with every sentence to be taken literally? Is it a cafeteria menu from which you may choose what to believe? Recently a school library banned the Bible from younger readers because of the "violence, rape, incest, and murder" described in its pages. Why we should study it?

What is "faith formation," anyway?
