

Vicar's Voice

Nearly a year ago, in January of 2023, I was no longer serving as a curate at St. Luke's in Seattle but instead focused on my hospital ministry and doing pulpit supply for other priests. (You may remember that this is when I first came to St. Antony's! I served for three Sundays last January while Father Craig was on pilgrimage in the Holy Land. I had no idea then that God would bring us back together!)

Back then, I was feeling spiritually exhausted from ministering in the hospital during the seemingly endless pandemic. I yearned for rest and comfort from God, and I felt a deep desire to take a pilgrimage to Canterbury in England to connect deeply with our Anglican roots. I started hunting around on the internet to see if a local Episcopal church was planning a trip anytime soon. I couldn't find one, but I did find a church in North Carolina planning a trip for Advent 2023, so I signed up. I thought I might be able to convince another priest, friend, or family member to accompany me, but the timing wasn't right for anyone else, but it was right for me! I signed up to journey to Canterbury with Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Greensboro, NC. Again, little did I know how much my life would change in the months to come! Thankfully, I will still be able to go on this pilgrimage, and I hope to bring back stories and learnings from the trip to share with you all. I'll be leaving December 1st and returning December 9th. The Reverend Gail Wheatley will be with you for the first Sunday of Advent on December 3rd, and I am delighted to welcome Father Dick Scott back to the pulpit to share a homily with us for the second Sunday of Advent on December 10th, when I return.

Advent, as we know, is the beginning of the liturgical church year! It is a time of new beginnings, new energy, and new hope. Traditionally, it was a fast, similar to Lent, but with an air of expectation and anticipation as Christians everywhere await the celebration of Christ's birth with the yearning and hope of families awaiting a new child. It's a story that never gets old-- God loved us so much that God became like one of us, a vulnerable baby, an embodied human through Jesus Christ. That's the story of God's love for us, through Christ and the coming of the Holy Spirit--over and over, God comes closer to us. May we be waiting and watching with Mary and Joseph this Advent, looking for we can join each other in this new beginning for St. Antony's!

May you feel God's loving presence close to you this Advent and be inspired to share that love generously with others. Amen.

Prison Ministry and Kairos

I was active with Kairos in Monroe, Washington State prior to answering the call to be a missionary for prison ministry in Uganda. I attended the monthly zoom meeting for Kairos Monroe. It was good to talk about how the ministry is proceeding there and in Uganda. The prison in Monroe has been allowing post-pandemic ministry. However, it is not Kairos. The volunteers are working to maintain the relationship with the prison and they are praying that they can resume the Kairos continuing ministry program.

Here in Uganda, the local team is actively sharing the gospel in the prisons of Koboko district each week. We look forward to opening a dialogue with the new Kairos Uganda national team about becoming part of Kairos. In my October newsletter I mentioned there was a series of emails exchanged between myself, Evelyn (CEO of Kairos), and Pastor Bernard (Kairos Uganda). In that exchange I mentioned my experience with Kairos. Normally, there are certain roles within Kairos that you hold only once, even if you change teams. Uganda does not have four-day Christian programs (like Cursillo, Walk to Emmaus, A4D, Via de Christo, ...). As a result, my background is unique (here). I mentioned it so it would be clear that I should not be considered a candidate for these roles (such as weekend leader), but I would help those selected, if desired. Evelyn response surprised me.

She wrote, "Your experience would be welcome and appreciated. ... We would consider using your experience as a Weekend Leader again also when we get to that stage – as they could use help setting it up correctly using experience when none of the team has any past experience. The group in Uganda has some planning to do ... Along with relations with the prisons and permission to do the program properly and get all the people in, etc. Your knowledge to help nationally advise is welcome."

I did not expect, nor did I seek to be Weekend Leader again. It was a blessed time. If God opens that door, I will go there. (Evelyn said consider, nothing more.) I was only seeking to be open and honest about what I can offer, including obedience to stay at the local, not national level. Now I am being invited to expand my role in prison ministry to working directly with those at the national level.

As this newsletter goes to print, I will be across the country in Kampala for a few meetings, including meeting with Pastor Bernard. I will also be meeting with the national prison chaplain for Uganda regarding the annual renewal of our letter granting permission for prison ministry in Koboko.

Transport

This is a plea for help to buy a vehicle in Uganda. Some of the roads are paved. Most of the roads I need to use for prison ministry are not. The dirt roads are frequently rutted and filled with potholes making them very rough on the chassis of a vehicle. I have been directed by other missionaries who have replaced vehicles after driving on Ugandan roads for a few years, that a Land Cruiser is the best choice for these roads. When I priced them, I was told that the vehicles are priced in USD and converted to Ugandan shillings at the time of purchase unless you have USD. I am trying to raise \$25,000 for the vehicle plus another \$25,000 to cover import fees, Ugandan road tax, and other taxes and fees. Uganda does not charge an annual registration; however, the one-time per vehicle road tax is high enough to make up for it.

A vehicle would allow the prison ministry to, 1) take more people to the prison for ministry, 2) respond to request to expand the prison ministry, 3) spend more time in ministry instead of looking for local transport that may or may not be available when we desire it. Thank you for praying about it.
